Council Proceedings.

Covington, La., July 27, 1909.
The Council met on above date, at the call of the Mayor.

Present—E. V. Richard, Mayor; J. Seiler, P. J. Lacroix, E. J. Frederick and Leon Hebert.
Absent—J. L. Smith and M. Planche.

The reading of the minutes of the last meeting was dispensed with and stand approved as recorded.

The following report of the town attorney was read:
Covington, La., July 27, 1909.
To the Hon. E. V. Richard, Mayor of the Town of Covington, La.

Sir—Having been requested by you for a written report as to the legality of the ordinance granting permission to the St. Tammany Ice & Mfg. Co., Ltd., of the Town of Covington, La., to lay pipes, etc., through the streets of the Town of Covington, La., and the question of furnishing water of the Town of Covington, La., I will say:

That nothing in the ordinance, as far as I can see, gives permission to the town authorities of the Town of Covington, La., to connect with the mains of this company and place in position hydrants for the purpose of combating fire; I will say that this ordinance gives full permission to the citizens of the Town of Covington, La., to use as much water as they will need for the purpose of extinguishing fires, but nothing therein indicates that it was the intention of the town authorities to connect with the pipes of this company by hydrants.

So therefore I must report that nothing in the ordinance, as far as I can see, would give permission to the town authorities to pass any resolution or ordinance whereby they would connect through hydrants with the pipes and water mains of this company, without compensation, and that the ordinance referred to is legal.

That this company ask your honorable body to turn Chemical Apparatus over to this company, we to take charge of the same, caring for and keeping it and its appurtenances in proper condition, and that your honorable body reimburse us with the sum of \$50 per quarter.

Said money to be used in building our own home, feeding of horse and paying of all other expenses incurred in the maintaining of said apparatus.

Dear Sir—Yours of July 22 received. In reply will say that I have accepted of plans for the Covington school house. The architect procured all sets of plans and specifications, and says the Town of Covington will pay him before they get a hold of them again. I wish to state that I am in position to furnish a set of plans for this work, and think I can furnish them much cheaper than you can get them from the architect. I would like to finish up this work, and think I could furnish plans and complete the job and save the town money. I am more familiar with the situation than anyone else, and would be glad to come to Covington and make some kind of a proposition to complete this work.

Slidell, La., July 28, 1909.

Be it ordained by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the Town of Slidell, in legal session convened, as follows:
