Franklinton.

Franklinton, La., Aug. 30.—This town suffered from a fire in the business section last night at 12 o'clock, and had it not been for the heroic work of the citizens and the plentifulness of the water from the artesian well near fire, an additional loss of at least \$20,000 would have been sustained. As it was, the fire was prevented from crossing Main street by hard work, and the residence of Captain T. G. Reddy, adjoining the Leader Publishing Company plant, was also the stopping place for the flames in that direction. No work was necessary to keep the flames from coming up Main street, the brick building of the Farmers and Merchants' Bank served as a barrier in that direction. The fire broke out in the upper story of the building occupied by the People's Drug Store. The upper story was unoccupied and the general opinion is that someone accidentally left a cigarette or something in the building, from which fire originated. The losses are as follows: Building owned by Mrs. Dean Pledge, Leader Publishing Co. office, People's Drug Store, barber shop and store building, \$1,750. No insurance. Building owned by E. D. Sheridan and used as a livery stable, \$1,500, no insurance. Leader Publishing Company, printing presses, etc., \$1,000, no insurance. People's Drug Company, stock and fixtures, \$2,000, insurance, \$750. T. G. Reddy, damage to household goods, \$100. S. D. Bullock, damage to residence occupied by Captain Reddy, \$50. Damage to store building of T. B. Erwin & Son, Ltd., \$100. Damage to windows in Farmers and Merchants' Bank building, \$50.

Zona, La. Aug. 30.—Will Myers, colored, was shot and seriously wounded this morning by another negro in the mill quarters here. Several shots were fired at Myers, three taking effect. Sheriff Magee was immediately notified, but has not yet arrested the guilty party. Sanford and Adams, after being shut down three days on account of a breakdown, are now running their saw mill in full force. A large number of people took advantage of the cheap excursion yesterday and attended the fifth Sunday school protracted meeting at Bogalusa. —Picayune.

TAX ORDINANCE

Section 1. Be it enacted by the Police Jury of the parish of St. Tammany, That there be and is hereby levied for the year 1909 a tax of 8 mills upon the dollar upon all taxable property in the parish for general parochial purposes, divided as follows: That 4 mills are hereby appropriated therefrom for criminal expenses, 3 mills for the benefit of public schools, 1 mill for general expenses and 2 mills for the benefit of public roads upon all property in the parish subject to taxation, including that situated in the towns of Covington and Mandeville.

Section 2. Be it further enacted, etc., That the sheriff and tax collector receive in full the taxes (the amount of the public school pay) fully approved by the grand and petit juries per diem and mileage and certificates of members of the police jury for per diem and mileage, and that he proceed with the collection of taxes now levied according to law.
