St. Tammany Parish Ships Oranges.
 It was with considerable pride that a short time since Mr. Anatole Beaudry exhibited and had photographed a beautiful pineapple, the native and tropical fruit of America, grown in his garden in Covington. It exceeded in flavor and aroma those shipped here from tropical climes. Oranges also have been grown here in times gone by, but not in quantities to attract much attention, although it has been claimed that the Satsuma grafted to a hardy stock would do well here. In verification of this, this week Mr. Herman Schultz shipped four barrels of Satsuma oranges to New Orleans. These oranges were grown on four small trees not over four or five feet high and five years old. The trees were so laden with fruit that the branches had to be propped up to keep them from breaking. The reputation of Louisiana for finely flavored oranges will not suffer any by comparison, and St. Tammany parish points to this incident as another illustration of the wonderful diversity of her products. This citrus may some day be commonly grown here. The fact that these oranges were unaffected by cold weather removes the only barrier to the raising of this fruit in St. Tammany parish.

The Farmer received several clusters of these oranges, with the compliments of "Anna's Villa, Mr. J. T. Brady's place on the Columbia Road, about five miles northeast of Covington, where they were raised. They are a seedless orange, very sweet and juicy and of excellent flavor.

Escape Through Jail Floor
 Several weeks ago Oscar Berry and Aaron Campbell were put off the N. O. G. N. train on which they were stealing a ride. They were subsequently placed in the Covington jail in default of fine in the Mayor's Court. They escaped from the jail and were rearrested and placed in the parish prison, where they were kept until they were taken to the Frederick rice farm near Madisonville to work under contract entered in between Mr. Frederick and the parish. Mr. Frederick had built a jail house for his contract prisoners which was considered to be perfectly strong and secure from any attempt at jail-breaking, but it appears that these two unruly prisoners have become expert at the business in some manner they secured a match, burned a hole through the floor and tunneled their way to liberty. They kept their mattress over the hole until opportunity offered for escape and are now at liberty.

Negro Desperado Shoots up Train
 Geo. Diggs, a big, strapping negro, recently from Florida, but employed in the mill of the Great Southern Lumber Company at Bogalusa, made an assault upon Conductor Leach, of the N. O. G. N. excursion train, Sunday evening, and attempted to draw his revolver, when Deputy A. C. Trepanier, Bogalusa, came to the conductors assistance, as did J. M. Johnson, Conductor Leach and Mr. Trepanier received some severe blows from the negro's revolver and it looked for a moment as if the negro would get the better of the three men; but changing his tactics he made a break to leave the car, which by this time had slowed down. Firing his revolver indiscriminately he leaped from the train, and proceeded to shoot up the car windows, when some of the passengers took a hand in the shooting. A. H. Slaydon, of the Great Southern Lumber Company, jumped from the car and knocked the big negro down with his fist. He was assisted by others and soon had him handcuffed and bound when it was discovered that he had been shot in the abdomen. He, with some witnesses, was taken back to New Orleans in a box car and sent to the hospital where the bullets were extracted. He was violent and unmanageable all on the operating table. It was with great difficulty that a lynch was prevented.

ORDINANCE.
 Be it ordained by the Police Jury of the Parish of St. Tammany, in legal session, that it shall be unlawful for, and all persons are hereby prohibited from severing the head of any hog from its body, before offering such hog or any portion thereof for sale.
 Section 2. Be it further ordained, that any person violating the provision of this ordinance, upon conviction thereof, shall be fined not less than twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) nor more than fifty dollars, (\$50.00) and in default of the payment of such fine be imprisoned, at the discretion of the court, for not more than thirty (30) days.
 Section 3. Be it further ordained, etc., that all ordinances contrary to and inconsistent with this Ordinance are hereby repealed.

ORDINANCE
 Be it ordained by the Police Jury of the Parish of St. Tammany, State of Louisiana, in legal session convened, that it shall be unlawful for any railroad, its employees or officers, to bury, burn or destroy any animal killed by such railroad, until the brand, mark, color and date of killing of such animal shall have been posted in a conspicuous place, in every depot of such railroad in the parish of St. Tammany.
 Section 2. Be it further ordained, etc., that any person who violates the provisions of this Ordinance, upon conviction thereof, shall be fined in the sum of not less than twenty-five dollars, nor more than fifty dollars, or shall be imprisoned in the parish jail for a term of not less than thirty (30) days nor more than fifty (50) days, or both, at the discretion of the court.
 Section 3. Be it further ordained, etc., that all Ordinances contrary to and inconsistent with this Ordinance be and the same are hereby repealed.
