TAX ORDINANCE

Be it ordained by the Mayor and Town Council of the Town of Covington, La., in legal session convened, that a tax of 7 1/2 mills be and is hereby levied on all taxable property of the town of Covington, La., for the year ending December 31, 1909, for the purpose of defraying the general expenses of the corporation.

Sec. 2. Be it ordained, etc., that a tax of 4 mills be and is hereby levied on all taxable property of the Town of Covington, La., for the year ending December 31, 1909, for school building purposes, according to an ordinance passed December 8, 1906.

Sec. 3. Be it ordained, etc., that the above tax is now due and collectible according to law.

Sec. 4. Be it ordained, etc., that this ordinance shall take effect immediately after its passage.

AN ORDINANCE

An ordinance providing for the appointment of a Park Commission, and defining their powers and duties, etc.

Be it ordained by the Mayor and Town Council of the Town of Covington, La., in regular session convened, that the Mayor by and with the approval of the Town Council of the Town of Covington, La., is hereby authorized to appoint certain residents of the Town of Covington, members of a Park Commission, to consist of not less than five or more than fifteen persons.

Sec. 2. Be it further ordained, etc., that the duties and powers of said Park Commission, shall be as follows: That they shall have power to enter into contracts for the purpose of beautifying and improving the Bogue Falaya Park, situated on the Bogue Falaya River in the Town of Covington, La.

That they shall have the right and authority to devise ways and means of raising money for the purpose of making such improvements or in any wise beautifying said park.

They shall have the right to charge for any and all privileges of erecting booths, or renting the pavilion for private dances, for granting concessions, etc., and to do any and all things that are necessary to the carrying on of the governing, care-taking and improvement of said Bogue Falaya Park.

Sec. 3. Be it further ordained, etc., that said Commission shall as soon as constituted and appointed, meet and adopt such rules and by-laws for their own government as they may see fit, and to elect such officers as are necessary, except the officer of chairman of said Commission, which position is hereby given solely to the Mayor to elect such officers.

Sec. 4. Be it further ordained, etc., that at all meetings of the Park Commission the chairman shall preside, and in the absence of the chairman, any member appointed by the Commission for that purpose shall preside in his stead.

CHARTER

OF
Mandeville Co-Operative
Drug Co., Limited.

United States of America,
State of Louisiana,
Parish of St. Tammany,
Town of Mandeville.

Be it known that on this 19th day of the month of December, one thousand nine hundred and nine, and of the Independence of the United States of America, the one hundred and thirty-fourth, before me William G. Davis, a notary public in and for the parish of St. Tammany, State of Louisiana, duly commissioned and qualified, and in the presence of the witnesses hereinafter named and undersigned, personally came and appeared the persons whose names are hereunto subscribed: All of lawful age and residing in this parish, who orally declared that availing themselves of the provisions of an act of the Legislature of this State known as Act No. 36 of the session of 1888, approved June 29, 1888, as well as the general laws of this State relative to the organization of corporations. They have formed and organized and by these presents do form themselves into and constitute a corporation for the objects and purposes and under the stipulations and agreements hereinafter set forth which they adopt as their charter, to-wit:

ARTICLE I.
The name of this corporation shall be MANDEVILLE CO-OPERATIVE DRUG CO., LIMITED, and it shall have its domicile in the town of Mandeville, and shall have and enjoy succession under its corporate name for a period of ninety-nine years from and after the date hereof.

ARTICLE II.
It shall commence business when five hundred dollars of the capital stock is subscribed, and may hold, purchase, sell, convey, lease, pledge or mortgage property personal, movable or immovable, sue and be sued, and may have a corporate seal, with such inscription or device as may be selected by the Board of Directors. The president or in the event of his death, absence or inability to act from any cause the vice-president is hereby designated, and in case of the absence of the vice-president the secretary shall act as the person upon whom all legal process shall be served.

ARTICLE III.
The object for this corporation is for the manufacture of and sale of drugs, medicine and toilet preparations of this and any other place that may be deemed necessary for the conduct of the business, to establish and maintain a retail drug store in which can be sold such articles as are usually sold in drug and general merchandise stores, to buy and sell real estate and enter into any contracts that may be necessary for the conduct of the business.

ARTICLE IV.
The capital stock of this corporation is hereby declared to be fixed at the sum of three thousand dollars, divided into three thousand shares of one dollar each, which shall be paid in cash at the time of subscription. The capital stock of said corporation may be increased to an amount not to exceed twenty thousand dollars. After the compliance with the provisions of the laws relative to the increasing capital stock of corporations, each stockholder shall be entitled to shares to any new or increase stock in proportion to the number of shares held by him.

ARTICLE V.
The business affairs of this corporation shall be managed by a board of twenty directors. Dr. Alonzo Givens, Chas. A. David, H. H. Levy, A. Hartman, W. G. Davis, Dr. L. M. Thompson, Dr. R. B. Paine, H. Meney, Jac. Levy, J. L. Smith, Henry Moreau, G. Reine, P. H. Hansbrough, W. R. Smith, E. H. Bandot, Jules

Poirson, Eugene Esquinance, G. F. Bierhorst, Isadore Levy and Louis Rosenthal, shall constitute the first Board of Directors, with Dr. Alonzo Givens as president, C. A. David as vice president, H. H. Levy secretary and A. Hartman treasurer, which officers and directors shall hold their respective offices until the 9th day of December, 1910, or until their successors shall have been duly elected and qualified. On the first Monday in December, 1910 and annually thereafter an election shall be held at the office of said corporation, after ten days notice shall have been given by postal card directed to each stockholder, and the directors then elected shall take their seats immediately after their election. The Board of Directors shall at their first meeting, which shall take place immediately after the election of Directors, elect a president, vice-president, secretary and treasurer. The said Board of Directors shall have power to make, change or alter all rules, by-laws, rules and regulations for the management of the business affairs of this corporation, to purchase, sell, mortgage or pledge property, personal, movable or immovable, and to do all other matters and things necessary and proper in the management of the business of said corporation. They shall appoint officers, agents, clerks and employees and fix their salaries and their duties, and seven of said Board shall constitute a quorum for the dispatch of or transaction of all business. Any vacancy occurring in the office of president or should the president be absent or unable to act from any cause, then the vice-president shall act as president pro tem. Any stockholder owning one share or more shall be eligible as a director, provided that only one member of any firm shall be eligible as a director.

ARTICLE VI.
Whenever this corporation shall terminate, either by limitation or from any other cause, its affairs shall be liquidated under the superintendence of the stockholders to be appointed for that purpose by a general meeting of the stockholders, convened after twenty days notice by postal card to each stockholder, and with the assent of the majority of the stockholders in amount of capital stock as set out in the articles of incorporation shall remain in office until the affairs of said corporation shall have been fully liquidated, and in case of death of any one or more of said commissioners the survivors shall continue to act.

ARTICLE VII.
This act of incorporation may be changed or the corporation may be dissolved with the assent of three-fourths of the stock represented and a majority in amount thereof, at any general meeting of the stockholders of said corporation convened for such purpose, after thirty days previous notice of such meeting shall have been given by sending postal cards to each stockholder.

ARTICLE VIII.
No stockholder shall ever be held liable for the contracts or faults of said corporation or for the unpaid balance due on the shares of stock then owned by him, nor shall any mere informality in organization have the effect of rendering this charter null or exposing a stockholder to any liability beyond the amount of his share.

ARTICLE IX.
This corporation shall go into operation as soon as five hundred shares of the capital stock shall have been subscribed and paid for.

ARTICLE X.
All transfers of stock shall be made on the books of said corporation on the surrender of certificate of the stock, and in the presence of the secretary. The person to whom the stock is to be transferred, must be acceptable to the Board of Directors, and such person shall sign the certificate as an original member, for each share of stock thus transferred.
