Death is always sad, but more so indeed when it takes away those who are young, beautiful and happy. How desolate it leaves the home and loved ones, how they shall miss his boyish laugh and merry songs, only those who have suffered can realize what desolation death has brought into the once happy home. Oh! Jesus, as Thou was once a boy we pray Thee to deal lightly with our dear boy. May his soul rest in peace.
