TO ORGANIZE CORN CLUB

V. L. Roy to be Here on January 25 to Assist Superintendent Peters in Arousing the Public to the Importance of this Movement.

Baton Rouge, La., Dec. 29, 1909.

Dear Sir—As promised, I shall be with you on January 25, 1910, to assist you in organizing your 1910 Boys' Corn Club. I think it is well to advise you in order to get all the boys and farmers you can at the meeting. If you hold an institute before the meeting, I would also advise that you take the matter up vigorously with your teachers, and get them to interest the boys. Let us try to have a big membership in your parish. Another good idea is to get your local agent in the Farmers' Cooperative Demonstration Work interested in the movement, so he may talk it up.

If you can, let me know how many members you expect, so that I may have the seed ready for distribution at the meeting. The best seed to use, in my opinion, is Shaw's Improved. Unless you have reasons to be of a different opinion, we will use this fairly hard, and the corn is a good yielder. If you prefer some other variety, I shall do all I can to help get your supply. As I stated at the Marksville meeting, we can not pay all expense of delivering it at the shipping point free. The cost will be about 25c per bushel for one gallon,

enough to plant nearly one acre. Your police jury or school board, I feel sure, will readily bear that expense. It would also be advisable to get before the meeting a fund for premiums, and you can then announce what premiums will be awarded. I shall help you make out the list of premiums. The police jury, school board, banks, merchants, parish fair boards and enterprising citizens may all be called on to help swell the premium list, which ought to run up to \$750, apart from the cost of the seed.

Be sure to let the boys know just when and where the meeting will take place, and give them through circular or press all the information you can relative to the club.

I trust you will see your way clear to attend the Farmers Short Course, which the College of Agriculture here is now offering, beginning January 10 and running two weeks. Now that agriculture is really being taught in our public schools, and what with the establishment of agricultural high schools, it is almost necessary that we get thoroughly in touch with the work and really qualify to advise relative to the teaching of this subject. This requires that we get as much knowledge of agriculture as possible. The cost will be nominal, and the benefits many. Very cordially,

CHARTER

Mandeville Co-Operative Drug Co., Limited.

United States of America, State of Louisiana, Parish of St. Tammany, Town of Mandeville.

Be it known, that on this 9th day of the month of December, one thousand nine hundred and nine, and of the Independence of the United States of America, the one hundred and thirty-fourth, before me William G. Davis, a notary public in and for the parish of St. Tammany, State of Louisiana, duly commissioned and qualified, and in the presence of the witnesses hereinafter named and undersigned, personally came and appeared the persons whose names are hereunto subscribed. All of lawful age and residing in this parish, who severally declared that availing themselves of the provisions of an act of the Legislature of this State known as Act No. 36 of the session of 1888, approved June 29, 1888, and all the general laws of this State relative to the organization of corporations. They have formed and organized and by these preformed a corporation to be known as the Mandeville Co-Operative Drug Co., Limited, and for the purposes and under the stipulations and agreements hereinafter set forth, which they adopt as their charter, to-wit:

ARTICLE I.
The name of this corporation shall be MANDEVILLE CO-OPERATIVE DRUG CO., LIMITED, and it shall have its domicile in the town of Mandeville, and shall have and enjoy succession under its corporate name for a period of ninety-nine years from and after the date hereof.

ARTICLE II.
It shall commence business when five hundred dollars of the capital stock is subscribed, and may hold, purchase, sell, convey, lease, pledge or mortgage property, real, personal, movable or immovable, and may sue and be sued, and may have a corporate seal, with such inscription or device as may be selected by the Board of Directors. The president or in the event of his death, absence or inability to act from any cause the vice-president is hereby designated, and in case of the absence of the vice-president the secretary as the person upon whom all legal process shall be served.

ARTICLE III.
The object for this corporation is for the manufacture of and sale of drugs, medicine and toilet preparations in this and any other place that may be deemed necessary for the conduct of the business, to establish and maintain a retail drug store in which can be sold such articles as are usually sold in drug and general merchandise stores, to buy and sell real estate and enter into any contracts that may be necessary for the conduct of the business.

ARTICLE IV.
The capital stock of this corporation is hereby declared to be fixed at the sum of three thousand dollars, divided into three thousand shares of one dollar each, which shall be paid in cash at the time of subscription. The capital stock of said corporation may be increased to an amount not to exceed twenty thousand dollars. After the compliance with the provisions of the laws relative to the increasing capital stock of corporations, to shares to any new or increase stock in proportion to the number of shares held by him.

ARTICLE V.
The business affairs of this corporation shall be managed by a board of twenty directors, Dr. Alonzo Givens, Chas. A. David, H. H. Levy, A. Hartman, W. G. Davis, Dr. L. M. Thompson, Dr. R. B. Paine, H. Borey, Jac Reine, J. L. Smith, Henry Menant, G. W. R. Smith, E. H. Bandot, Jules

Poisson, Eugene Esquinance, G. F. Bierhorst, Theodore Levy and Louis Rosenthal, shall constitute the first Board of Directors, with Dr. Alonzo Givens as president, C. A. David as vice president, H. H. Levy secretary and A. Hartman treasurer, which officers and directors shall hold their respective offices until the 9th day of December, 1910, or until their successors shall have been duly elected and qualified. On the first Monday in December, 1910 and annually thereafter an election shall be held at the office of said corporation, after ten days notice shall have been given by postal card directed to each stockholder, and the directors then elected shall take their seats immediately after their election. The Board of Directors shall take place immediately after the election of Directors, elect a president, vice-president, secretary and treasurer. The said Board of Directors shall have power to make, change or alter all the rules, by-laws, regulations or regulations for the management of the business affairs of this corporation, to purchase, sell, mortgage or pledge property, personal, movable or immovable, and to do all other matters and things necessary and proper in the management of the business of said corporation. They shall appoint officers, agents, clerks and employees and fix their salaries and their duties, and seven of said Board shall constitute a quorum for the dispatch of or transaction of all business. Any resignation of any member of the Board of Directors, and should there be any vacancy occurring in the office of president or should the president be absent or unable to act from any cause, then the vice-president shall act as president pro tem. Any stockholder owning one share or more of the capital stock of this corporation shall be eligible as a director, provided that only one member of any firm shall be eligible as a director.

ARTICLE VI.
Whenever this corporation shall terminate, either by limitation or from any other cause, its affairs shall be liquidated under the supervision of the stockholders to be appointed for that purpose by a general meeting of the stockholders, convened after twenty days notice by postal card to each stockholder, and with the assent of the majority of the stockholders in amount of capital stock. Said common shares shall remain in office until the affairs of said corporation shall have been fully liquidated, and in case of death of any one or more of said commissioners the survivors shall continue to act.

ARTICLE VII.
This act of incorporation may be changed or the corporation may be dissolved with the assent of three-fourths of the stock represented and a majority in amount thereof, at a general meeting of the stockholders convened for such purpose after thirty days previous notice of such meeting shall have been given by sending postal cards to each stockholder.

ARTICLE VIII.
No stockholder shall ever be held liable for the contracts further sum said corporation or for the unpaid balance due on shares of stock then owned by him, nor shall any mere informality in organization have the effect of rendering this charter null or exposing a stockholder to any liability beyond the amount of his share.

ARTICLE IX.
This corporation shall go into operation as soon as five hundred shares of the capital stock shall have been subscribed and paid for.

ARTICLE X.
All transfers of stock shall be made on the books of this corporation on the surrender of the certificate of the stock, and the presence of the secretary. The person to whom the stock is to be transferred, must be acceptable to the Board of Directors, and such person shall sign the charter as an original member, for each share of stock thus transferred.
