Covington, La., Jan. 11, 1910. The Parish School Board met in the Courthouse on the above date with all members present. Mr. C. A. David in the chair.

Minutes of the meeting of Oct. 2, 1909, and also of the meeting of Nov. 22, 1909, were read and approved as read.

The following report of Hon. J. B. Lancaster, who was employed at the meeting held April 17, 1909, to make a thorough investigation of the financial standing of the different wards was read and accepted.

Pigott, that the bid of Jenkins Bros., for \$9,631 for the completion of the Covington High School building according to the plans and specifications made by Jenkins Bros., architects, and accepted by this Board, be accepted, and said contract awarded to the said Jenkins Bros. upon their entering into bond in the amount as now fixed by law, the sureties on said bond to be approved by the president and the attorney of the Board. Bond to be filed within ten days from January 11, 1910.

Moved by Dr. Pigott, seconded by Parker, that the note held by the St. Tammany Banking Company & Savings Bank be paid and a warrant ordered drawn for same.

Moved by Mr. Gause, seconded by Dr. Pigott, that Prof. E. E. Lyon and Misses Salome Seiler and Olive Mather be appointed an examining committee, as recommended by the Superintendent.
