**WASHINGTON PARISH
CORN CLUB MEETING.**

The following account of the meeting of the Washington parish Corn Club appears in the Times-Democrat of the 15th inst. As the 9:40 train came in this morning an unexpected crowd met the sight of the passengers—500 school children with their teachers lined up, with banners flying, to welcome Professor L. V. Roy of the State University of Agriculture and J. A. Evans, State Demonstration Agent, who had an appointment to meet the Washington Parish Corn Club and farmers here at 10 o'clock to-day. The meeting, held at the courthouse, was called to order by Superintendent of Education J. W. Bateman. Cards were then distributed for enrollment in the Corn Club. Mr. Bateman gave a short sketch of the club which was organized in 1908 with forty-one members. At today's meeting it numbered 400.

The people of this Parish are so interested in this move that numbers of valuable prizes, besides about \$75 in cash, have been donated in order to secure the greatest possible interest in the matter. Professor Roy was introduced and until 12 o'clock instructed his hearers in every phase of corn culture. At noon all visiting pupils and teachers were marched to the F. C. I. Campus and served with lunch.

The meeting re-assembled in the school auditorium at 1 o'clock, when Mr. Evans dwelt at length upon the boll weevil, the draining, planting and cultivating of corn.

An unusual interest is being manifested in this movement by the people throughout the whole parish.
