POLICE JURY

Covington, La., April 18, 1910.
The Police Jury met in regular session on above date.

Present—Geo. Koeppe, Jr., President, M. Fitzgerald, Herman Schultz, Geo. F. Bierhorst, Crawford Williams, A. D. Crawford, J. J. Cusachs, B. A. Schneider and J. W. Decker.

It was moved by J. J. Cusachs, seconded by H. Schultz, that the meeting be adjourned until the next meeting be dispensed with, and that they stand adopted as recorded.

Carried.
Attorney F. J. Heintz, presented some old warrants and orders against the parish, to the amount of \$496, dated 1871-72 etc.

It was moved by B. A. Schneider, seconded by J. J. Cusachs, that said warrants and orders presented by attorney F. J. Heintz, be rejected.

Carried.
Moved and duly seconded that the janitors salary be raised to \$30 per month.

Carried.
It was moved and duly seconded that the old fence in the rear of the courthouse be torn down and a new fence put up and whitewashed.

Carried.
Mr. Herman Schultz was appointed a committee of one to have said fence put up and whitewashed.

The following communication was received and read:
Covington, La., April 18, 1910.

Police Jury, Parish of St. Tammany, Gentlemen:—The electrical wiring in the courthouse has been inspected by the State Board of Underwriters, also has been found to be in a dangerous condition. All the wiring both in the courthouse and jail has been condemned and will have to be done over according to the rules and regulations of the State Board of Underwriters.

I propose to re-wire the courthouse and jail according to the rules and regulations laid down by the above body. The work can be done either in the knob and tube system, or the conduit; the latter being the safest.

I propose to do the work in the knob and tube system for the sum and amount of ninety-five dollars or do it with steel conduit for the sum of one-hundred and fifty dollars.
