Settlement Reached
 The following settlement has been made of the case against the New Orleans Great Northern to compel a restoration of the railway track between St. Tammany and Pearl River: C. W. Robinson et al vs. New Orleans Great Northern Railroad Company, No. 1448.
 Twenty-sixth Judicial District Court, Parish of Washington.
 It is hereby agreed between the plaintiffs, the intervenors and the defendant that the judgment annexed to this agreement shall be entered in this case by the court as a compromise of the matters in issue between the parties.
 It is further agreed that the judge shall sign this judgment in vacation, as if in term time, and that the said judgment shall have the same effect as if contradictorily entered in term time at Franklinton.

 C. W. Robinson et al vs. New Orleans Great Northern Railroad Company, No. 1448.
 Twenty-sixth Judicial District Court, Parish of Washington.
 The parties in this cause having reached a compromise of the issues involved in this case and having agreed upon a form of judgment to be entered in this cause defining the rights of the parties.
 It is therefore ordered, adjudged and decreed that the demand of the plaintiff and intervenors against the defendant to compel the defendant to restore the track of the old East Louisiana Railway Company between St. Tammany station and between Mandeville Junction be rejected.
 It is further ordered, adjudged and decreed.
 1st. That the defendant shall establish within ninety (90) days from the date of this judgment, a train service once a day each way from Pearl River to St. Tammany five days per week, to-wit on Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, Saturday and Sunday.
 2d. That connections with these trains shall be so arranged as to meet trains both on the New Orleans and the New Orleans Great Northern railroads at Florenville, the connections to be so arranged, if possible, as to enable travelers to go to New Orleans and return on either of the other connecting lines.
 3d. That the said trains shall be what is known as mixed trains, but it shall contain a passenger coach so that the passengers may not be forced to ride in a caboose.
 4th. That the station at Hill Switch be re-established as formerly so that freight can be consigned and shipped to and from the mill of Crawford Brothers which is located at Hill Switch.
 5th. That freight shall be handled to and from St. Tammany, Hill Switch, Pearl River and such other stations which the railroad company may establish along the line, not alone for the plaintiffs and intervenors, but for any person that may desire to ship freight to and from these points.
 It is further ordered, adjudged and decreed, that the ninety days delay above given in paragraph one of this judgment is to enable the defendant to repair its track so as to provide properly and safely for the movement of the train provided by this judgment, and that during the said ninety days the service as now established and operative on said road shall continue until the expiration of said ninety days.
 It is further ordered, adjudged and decreed, that the defendant is enjoined and restrained from taking up its track from Pearl River Junction to Florenville and from Florenville to St. Tammany.
 It is further ordered, adjudged and decreed, that the defendant pay all the costs of this proceeding.
 Thus done and signed at Covington, in the Parish of St. Tammany, State of Louisiana, this 25th day of May, A. D. 1910, and out of term time, by consent and agreement of all parties in interest, as per stipulation on file herein.
