Be it Resolved, That the town marshal, whenever he sees fit, take samples from any one selling milk in the town of Covington, such samples to be sent to the State Board of Health for an accurate analysis.
Be it Resolved, That this board recommend for passage by the City Council an ordinance providing for the screening of all fruit stands, confectioneries, meat and fish markets and bakeries by fine wire screens, said screens to be made of not less than No. 2 mesh wire.

Be it Resolved, That the town council make provision for the registration of all births, marriages and deaths in the town of Covington.

CHARTER
State of Louisiana, Parish of St. Tammany.
Be it known, That on this 31st day of May, 1910, before me Edward H. Richard, a notary public of the Parish of St. Tammany, State of Louisiana, personally came and appeared, Jasper E. Nilson, President and Adolph A. Frederick, Secretary, of the said Nilson & Sears Co., Ltd., duly held after due notice as required by law, for the purpose of considering the proposition of changing the name of said corporation, and to amend Article No. 1 of the charter of said corporation. That at said meeting of said stockholders, at which all the stock of said corporation, was represented by the owners thereof, or by written proxy, the following resolution was unanimously adopted:
Resolved, That the charter of the Nilson & Sears Company, Limited, be amended, and especially Article No. 1 of said charter.
Be it further resolved, That said Article No. 1, shall be amended to read as follows:
ARTICLE I.
The name and style of this corporation shall be NILSON & FREDERICK COMPANY, LIMITED. The place of its domicile shall be in the town of Covington, Parish of St. Tammany, State of Louisiana.
The purpose for which it is established, and the nature of the business to be carried on by it is that of insurance agency or brokerage, the carrying on as agents or brokers the business of effecting insurances of all kinds, whether life, fire, accident, tornado, casualty, fidelity, river, marine or other insurances, and for the purpose of operating a general agency business for purchasing of real estate and for the improvement of same, to buy, sell, hypothecate, mortgage, effect and exchange any and all kinds of real property, improved and unimproved, to conduct a building and loan association, business such as is authorized by the laws of the State of Louisiana, to act as agents or brokers for any kind of legitimate business, to act as real estate agents for the buying and selling of lands on commission, and as heretofore authorized by the laws of the State of Louisiana, to act as agents or brokers for the collection of rents and other business incidental thereto or advantageous in connection therewith.
Citation and all process shall be served on the president, and in his absence upon the secretary and a treasurer.
This corporation shall have all the rights and privileges granted by law to corporations.
That the virtue of the power given to us by said charter, we, Jasper E. Nilson, president, and Adolph A. Frederick, secretary, do hereby amend the said Article No. 1 of the charter of the said Nilson & Sears Co., Ltd., in accordance with the resolution adopted on the 12th day of May, 1910, and we do declare, that from this day, the said charter of the said corporation do be, and is hereby amended, and especially Article No. 1 of said charter, so as to read as set forth in the said resolution, herein above incorporated.
