

OIL MAY BE FOUND

Spindle Top was an accident, and both the Jennings and Beaumont oil fields record some sad experiences. Many a well was sunk and abandoned before the lucky strike was made that brought forth gushers and pushed land values beyond the reach of the timid and into the hands of the speculator.

The oil-bearing sands from this well give positive indications that oil exists, and it is said that some oil actually came from the well. Be this as it may, experts are confident that this field will produce oil, and with the exact knowledge which experience has given them of the depth at which casings will have to be put in, it is believed the next well will be a success.

Opportunities are often lost by lack of that venturesome spirit that is not afraid to take risks if the possible reward is great enough. It is the spirit that built up the west, and it is the spirit that has made Texas one of the greatest States in the Union.

An illustration of the peculiar uncertainty of the search for oil is given in the experience of Capt. Pickett when he was sinking wells for the Guffy Co. in the Jennings field. His first and unsuccessful well was 1900 feet. Finally, two years later, information was gained that the proper depth was 1730 feet.

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Oil will probably be found in St. Tammany parish when some company comes along with the means to back the undertaking, but, as we said before, the risk is too great for a man with small means. For the man who can afford the risk, there is a chance to make a fortune.

Miss Sophie Wright's lecture, "Ben Hur," at the Rutland Theatre, Thursday evening, was very much enjoyed by a large and select audience. The lecture was under the auspices of the King's Daughters. Miss Wright was taken from the train to Mrs. Wm. Bodebender's residence in a carriage, being escorted by Mrs. Williams and Mrs. Pragas Burns, one of the members of the reception committee. After refreshments and a rest from the fatigue of the journey, Miss Wright was introduced at the Rutland by Mrs. Dr. Warren, who was very happy in her remarks and was entitled to share in the applause that greeted her announcement that "it was evident from the applause that Miss Wright was too well known to need introduction to a Covington audience."

As Miss Wright laid aside her crutches and stood beside her chair she was greeted with a storm of applause that was an echo of the love that her life of sacrifice for the uplift of her fellow creatures has created for her wherever she is known. Lifting to her face the bouquet of beautiful white flowers that had been handed up from the audience, Miss Wright said, the daisies reminded her of the King's Daughters of Covington—the yellow corona, the heart of gold; the white petals, the characteristic purity of their life's work. She spoke affectionately of her boys and her voice was filled with emotion and pride as she referred to the fact that up to the time of the closing of her school she had assisted 25,000 boys in securing a foothold in education.

Miss Wright's lecture was made doubly interesting by evident sympathy for Ben Hur in his trials, and her emotional portrayal of the faith of the three wise men guided by the light of the star to the birthplace of Christ in the manger at Bethlehem. The illustrations were excellent and instructive, and the evening was very much enjoyed by all.

Supreme Court Decision.

The court in the case of the New Orleans Great Northern Railroad Company vs. the Railroad Commission held that when anyone wants to attack the right of the commission to issue and enforce an order that it must be done within three months of the date of the issuance of such order. Plaintiff was ordered to build a station at Franklinton, and was notified to do so November 28, 1909, and on April 14, 1910, the railroad sought an injunction to stop the commission from enforcing its order, but the trial court held that it had applied for the injunction at too late a date, and this decision was affirmed by the Supreme Court, with Justice Nicholls as the organ.
