A NEW INDUSTRY FOR ST. TAMMANY PARISH.

There are a great many industries for rural development that have been proposed for St. Tammany parish. We say rural development because it has been the intention of those who have been instrumental in introducing new features into the agricultural pursuits of the parish to improve the condition of the rural people—to increase the value of their property and to place them in a position of independence, that they may surround themselves with the comforts of life and have the time and means to devote themselves to solving those problems which must be solved for their material welfare and the welfare of St. Tammany parish.

Capt. G. E. Millar, of Abita Springs, has done much to promote interest in shipping truck to foreign markets. Mr. Geo. Koepf, of Madisonville, Geo. M. Fenderson, of Folsom, and Mr. V. Olivier, of Ramsay, have worked and preached for the development of the agricultural resources of the parish, and their labors have not all been in vain. Large shipments of beans were made at Folsom this season at a profit. Much truck was shipped from the neighborhood of Madisonville, Houllonville and Goodbee. A carload of potatoes was shipped from Abita Springs to Chicago, and more will be shipped next year. As a consequence, the market here now is not glutted, and those who have potatoes to sell at this time are getting one dollar a bushel for them. Mr. E. J. Domergue, Jr., and Mr. Geo. E. Sears, Sr., of Covington, have tried to introduce the raising of beans and peanuts, and Mr. Domergue offered to purchase the necessary machinery for handling the crop and to purchase all that was raised at the market price, if a sufficient area was planted. He was not successful in getting a large number interested in the venture, but may be more successful next year.

A new undertaking is that of Mr. P. H. Thompson, of Abita Springs. He has planted two acres in broom corn. The cost of preparing this land is \$120.00; rather expensive, some may say. But broom corn is worth \$320.00 a ton, so that if the venture is successful in the way of growing the crop, the experiment will be worth the expense. We need more men like Mr. Thompson in this community—men who are not afraid to take the risk if there is anything in sight.

ROCKEFELLER PLEADS FOR UNIVERSAL PEACE.

Oil Magnate Declares Time Has Come For Religious Move.

Cleveland, O., July 10.—John D. Rockefeller, speaking before the Euclid Avenue Baptist Church here today, declared that the time had come for a universal religion. Mr. Rockefeller read an article from the Outlook, the magazine of which Theodore Roosevelt is associate editor, which pleaded for a fusion of the Christian churches. The article quoted a letter from Mgr. Bonomelli, bishop of Cremona, Italy, addressed to the recent world's missionary conference at Edinburgh, Scotland, in which the Catholic prelate also advocated a union of all Christian congregations.

In his address Mr. Rockefeller declared that his church and Sunday school work was one of the things in life which gave him his sincerest pleasure.

J. C. FREEMAN LYNCHED.

Rayville, La., July 10.—J. C. Freeman was taken from the Parish Jail here last night and lynched. The convicted murderer of Town Marshal C. C. Chenault was hanged from the rafters of his own blacksmith shop.

Denied a new trial, Freeman, through Attorney Moore, had taken an appeal to the Supreme Court. This was interpreted by some citizens here as meaning a delay in the administration of justice.

The mob tacked a strip of paper, four inches wide and five feet long, over the door of the blacksmith shop with this inscription: "The Outcome of Moore's Appeal."

CATHOLIC DOINGS.

The priests' retreat at St. Joseph's Abbey, near Rayville, came to an end at 5 o'clock this morning, all the members taking holy communion from the hand of the Most Rev. Archbishop, and departed on the 6:32 a. m. train for their respective fields of labor.

The Most Rev. Archbishop went along as far as Slidell, where a carriage awaited him to bring him and his Secretary, Rev. Paul Jeannard, to Bonfouca to confer the holy rites of confirmation. This afternoon the same takes place in Slidell, and tomorrow in Mandeville in the morning and at 4 p. m. in Madisonville. Sunday, July 17, holy confirmation will be given in St. Peter's Church in Covington. After 10 a. m. candidates for the candidates of Covington and Abita Springs. Confession and communion in preparation of it is to be made in Abita Springs and Covington respectively. Covington is to have holy mass at 7:30 and 10 a. m. and Abita at 8 and 10 a. m. Candidates for the last place might come to Covington on the 6:38 a. m. motor car or on the excursion train.

Monday morning's train takes the Archbishop to Bogaloussa for the same purpose, whence he returns in the evening to St. Joseph's Abbey along with the second section of the diocesan clergy to enter on the second retreat from Monday, July 18, night, to Friday, July 22, morning.
