DR. A. H. BOREY.
Friday afternoon at four o'clock loving hands laid to rest in the family tomb the casket bearing the remains of Dr. A. H. Borey, one of the most popular, genial, and capable of the younger generation of local physicians, who died at 3:30 o'clock on Thursday afternoon at his residence, No. 2026 Tulane Avenue. A week ago he was stricken with appendicitis and last Sunday he was operated on. The heroic measure proved futile, however, for he sank steadily to the end.



Dr. Borey was but twenty-five years of age, a son of Mayor H. Borey of Mandeville. He graduated from the medical department of Tulane University four years ago and already had built up a great practice which indicated for him a great future in his chosen field of labor. The news of his demise, coming so suddenly and unexpectedly to his countless friends, occasioned deep and widespread sorrow, for he was admired and esteemed by all who knew him, for his many traits, his kindness, gentleness, and generosity.

The deceased is survived by his young wife, one little son, his father, three brothers—Dr. Charles A. Borey, Harmon Borey, and Rene Borey, of this city, and one sister, Mrs. J. M. Richardson, of Amite City, La.

HON. SAMUEL L. GILMORE.
Hon. Samuel L. Gilmore, who has been in Abita Springs some weeks to rest up and regain his health and strength, died at the Baldwin place, which he has rented for the season, at 3:45 on the morning of July 18, 1910.

Mr. Gilmore had shown some improvement in health, and his friends had entertained hopes that this improvement was permanent. Mrs. Gilmore and children, Mr. S. L. Gilmore, Jr., and Miss Martha Gilmore were at the bedside when death came. Dr. L. C. Heintz of Abita Springs and Dr. Burthe of New Orleans were his physicians, and did all that it was possible to do for him.

Mr. Gilmore was a Representative in the United States Congress from the Second District, and was a man of brilliant attainments, having served as District Attorney for New Orleans with distinction. He had many warm friends, both personal and political, and his death will be a great loss. He was born in New Orleans, July 30, 1850, and was a son of the late Thos. Gilmore and Elizabeth A. Clancy. He was a graduate of Seton Hall College of South Orange, N. J.

The remains were embalmed and taken to New Orleans for interment.

WM. D. HOYLE.
Wm. D. Hoyle, formerly a resident of Abita Springs, died at his residence in New Orleans, 422 Henry Clay Avenue, on Wednesday, July 20, 1910. He leaves his widow and son, Miss Leah M. Hoyle, and his brother, John M. Hoyle.

Deceased was born in New Orleans February 26, 1860, and was the son of John Hoyle. He was a graduate of the Jefferson Agricultural and Mechanical College of Baton Rouge. At the time of his death he was agent for the New York Life Insurance Co.
