COTTON STATES LEAD IN AVERAGE PRODUCTION OF CORN.

Nine cotton-growing states are producing more corn than the average Eastern and Western states, according to a report issued by Martin V. Calvin, director of the Georgia Experiment Station.

Mr. Calvin's figures give the following production of corn by Southern states in 1909:

Table with 2 columns: States and Bushels. Lists states like North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia, Alabama, Mississippi, Louisiana, Texas, Arkansas, and Oklahoma with their respective bushel counts.

The corn from these states totaled 61,787,000 bushels more than was produced by Pennsylvania, South Dakota, Kansas and Colorado.

Mr. Calvin says he chose these Northern states as the basis of comparison because they "more nearly than any others approached the average yield per acre in the United States."

These Northern states, the report says, produced nearly twice as much corn per acre as did the cotton states. The acre yield in the North averaged 25.5 bushels, against 15.4 bushels in the South.

Mark that fact, for the report adds: "It locates the weak spot in our favor. It tells us that we need not increase our corn acreage one inch. What we need to do is to increase our average yield per acre."

How this increase may be accomplished is then shown by figures from the Georgia Experiment Station's work, where an average yield of 45.6 bushels per acre was obtained in 1909.


