## SLEEPING IN THE OPEN AIR

Useful Book With Full Directions Given Away by Philanthropic Association.

"Direction for Living and Sleeping in the Open Air," is the title of a pamphlet being sent out by the National Association for the Study and Prevention of Tuberculosis to its local representatives in all parts of the United States. The pamphlet is meant to be a handbook of information for anybody who desires to sleep out of doors in his own home. It emphasizes the fact that outdoor sleeping is as desirable for the well as for the sick. The booklet will be sent free of charge to any one applying for it at the headquarters of the National Association for the Study and Prevention of Tuberculosis in New York, or to the secretary of any local or state tuberculosis association.

Some of the subjects of which the pamphlet treats are: how to take the open-air treatment in a tenement house; how to build a small shack or cabin on a flat roof in the city; how to make one comfortable while sleeping outdoors either in hot or cold weather; how to arrange a porch on a country house; and how to build a cheap porch; the construction of tents and tent houses; the kinds of beds and bedding to use in outdoor sleeping; and various other topics. The book is well illustrated and attractively prepared.

## MANY TASTY DISHES

RECIPES WHICH WILL BE RELISHED BY JADED APPETITES.

**Delicious Dinner Salad, Chantilly Tarts With Fresh Strawberries—How to Prepare Boiled Lettuce and Other Hints to the Cook.**

**Dinner Salad.**—For a dinner salad shred a small head of cabbage and let it stand in ice water for an hour or two. Just before it is to be served drain and dry it, mix it with very finely cut white celery—enough to give it a celery flavor—and toss it thoroughly in the following dressing: Rub a bowl with the cut side of a piece of garlic, put in a salt spoonful of salt, a dash of pepper, a drop of tabasco sauce and six tablespoonfuls of olive oil. When the ingredients are blended add a tablespoonful of tarragon vinegar and emulsify.

**Boiled Lettuce.**—Boiled lettuce is little known to the average housekeeper, but it has many friends among Europeans. The heads should be cleaned, washed and tied so that the leaves will be close together. Put the lettuce heads in a large saucenpan in which there is salted water, and cook them in boiling salted water until tender. Lift them carefully from the pan, drain them and press free of water. Put them in a circle on a round dish and cover with a sauce made of melted butter seasoned with salt, pepper and a little vinegar. Or it may be served with cream sauce.

**Home Made Bonbons.**—Colored bonbons, home made, are served with tea instead of cube sugar. They are usually flavored with lemon. Tea with lemon clears the complexion. For exhaustion tea should be drunk clear and sipped very slowly.

**Stuffed White Cherries.**—White cherries stuffed with cream cheese and served in lettuce leaves with mayonnaise are delicious for the salad course, but are not recommended for the family where there is "one maid and six small children."

**Chantilly Tarts.**—Chantilly tarts are excellent made with fresh strawberries. The shells are made of puff paste. The strawberries should be sweetened and allowed to stand in the sunshine for fifteen or twenty minutes. Both the strawberries and the shells should then be set on the ice and when cold put together and the berries covered with a rosette of whipped cream.

**A Fireless Cooker.**—A new fireless cooker, made of heavy tinned copper, with heavy sheet aluminum kettles, claims many merits because of its materials and insulation. With the cooker goes a pamphlet giving the time required for cooking the various cereals, meats, fish, fruits, vegetables and deserts.

**Cake for Children.**—Cakes that the children are "crazy about" call for a cupful of sugar, a cupful of rolled oats and an egg beaten with the sugar. At the last stir in a handful of stoned raisins and vanilla and drop on greased pans by the teaspoonfuls. Bake in a slow oven.

**Strawberry Sponge.**—Strawberry sponge is made as follows: Soak half a box of gelatine in a cup and a half of cold water. Add a cupful of sugar and when the jelly is cold, but before it begins to thicken, stir in a pint of strawberries that have been washed and rubbed through a sieve. Fold in the stiffly beaten whites of two eggs and when the mixture is thoroughly blended turn into one large or several small individual molds and place on the ice. Serve with cream.

**Almond Cake Filling.**—For almond cake filling beat the whites of two eggs stiff and whip into them a cupful and three-quarters of powdered sugar. Add half a pound of almonds that have been blanched and mortared to a paste with a little sugar and flavor lightly with vanilla. The frosting should be beaten very thoroughly after the nuts go in.

## Breakfast in the Bedroom.

The summer hostess considers carefully the question of the breakfast tray for there are many guests whose custom it is to partake of this meal in bed, or at least in their own rooms, in the ease of dressing gown and informal attire, and a dainty means of serving this bedroom breakfast must be provided beforehand. In a large country house two footmen are usually kept busy from eight o'clock until ten in the morning, carrying breakfast trays about, and special china is usually supplied for these trays—rather small cups and dainty cream, sugar and coffee receptacles in individual size.

## Boiled Tongue.

Boil a tongue until tender, peel, and put back into the liquor it was cooked in; season with salt and pepper. Fry a small onion in a slice of salt pork or bacon; thicken with a tablespoonful of flour; add to the tongue and let boil until quite tender. If the liquor is not thick enough, add a little more flour. Serve hot with the liquor poured over the tongue. Also good cold.

## Raisin Coffee Cake.

One and one-half tablespoonfuls lard or butter. Three tablespoonfuls sugar. Cream these. One egg, one cup sweet milk, one-quarter teaspoon salt, two cups flour, three teaspoons baking powder, one-half cup small raisins, put in good size pan, pour melted butter over top, sprinkle with sugar and cinnamon, and bake in moderate oven.

## Sagging Cane Seats.

If the sagging of cane chairs sag, turn them upside down, wash well with soapy water, soaking so as to thoroughly wet them. In drying they will stiffen almost to their normal state. It is well to begin this treatment before the seats have sagged badly, and if kept up the chairs will wear a long time.

## Spiced Beef.

Five pounds of the shank boiled five hours with celery seed to taste; when boiled, drain off the gelatine and chop meat very fine. If you have not got a food chopper, add pepper and salt to taste, then put into a cloth on a platter, cover it with the cloth and press it.

## JERUSALEM

By Pastor Russell Brooklyn, N. Y.

"Comfort ye, comfort ye my people, saith your God. Speak ye comfortably to Jerusalem, and cry unto her that her iniquity is pardoned; for she hath received of the Lord's hand double for all her sins."—Isa. liii. 1.

Christendom, with united voice, admits that all of the divine revelation came to and through the Hebrew people. Listen to the argument of the Apostle Paul. "What advantage then hath the Jew? Or what profit is there of circumcision? Much every way; chiefly, because that unto them were committed the oracles of God"—the Divine message respecting the Divine purposes, present and to come. The Apostle again informs us that the entire Gospel message was briefly comprehended in the Creator's promise to Abraham. "In thy seed shall all the families of the earth be blessed" (Galatians iii. 8).

It was the most natural thing imaginable for the Jewish nation to suppose that the giving to them of the law at Mount Sinai, through the mediatorship of Moses, was the fulfillment of the promise to Abraham. Nevertheless they were mistaken. Israel's mediator, and the sacrificing priests, and the sacrifices they offered and their Tabernacle, with its holy and most holy, and the temple, and all the features of the law Covenant were types or foreshadows of the "better sacrifices," higher priesthood, better mediator, and glorious blessings of eternal forgiveness and reconciliation yet to be accomplished. Nevertheless the period of Israel's types was not wasted. Not only were the types there given, but at the same time a special class of agents were selected: Abraham, Isaac, Jacob, and all the prophets and worthy ones of that age, holy consecrated to God, and accepted as agents qualified for the kingdom conditions. Of these the scriptures declare, "They fell asleep." They are still asleep in the dust of the earth, awaiting the glorious resurrection morning, and a grand share then with Messiah in the work then to be accomplished. In their lifetime, they were styled the fathers, because Messiah was to be of the posterity of Abraham, and also "David's Son."

But other scriptures without contradicting these statements, show us distinctly that "David's Son" and "Abraham's Seed" is to be lord and father of both David and Abraham. Thus we read, "Instead of thy fathers shall be thy children, whom thou mayest make princes in all the earth" (Psalm xiv. 16). David's son, Messiah, will be David's father, or life-giver, when he will raise David from the dead. Similarly he will be the father of all of these ancient worthies; and as David's Lord and "Lord of lords," it will be his pleasure to appoint the Abraham, Isaac, Jacob and all of the ancient worthies, and prophets, and faithful ones a glorious share with himself in the great Messianic kingdom, which he is about to set up for the ruling and blessing of Israel and all the nations of the earth.

Glance with me at three different statements by the lord through the prophets of Israel respecting Israel's "double" of experience: The first, an experience of God's favor; the second, an experience of equal length without divine favor.

Turn now to Zechariah's prophecy, and note that prophetically he takes his standpoint at the very time when the second part of the "double" began. His words are, "Even today do I declare that I will render double unto thee (Zechariah ix. 12).

Come next to our text, and note that the prophet Isaiah stands with us, and views the matter from the standpoint that the "double" of experience has been fulfilled: "speak comfortably unto Jerusalem, cry unto her that her appointed time is accomplished, because she hath received of the Lord's hands double (two equal parts) for her sins." It is our understanding that this "double" reached fulfillment in the year 1878 A. D., and since that date we have been declaring to the best of our ability, as the lord granted opportunity, these comforting words to Israel, assuring God's chosen people that their period of divine favor has ended, and that they are gradually returning to prosperity, that divine favor began with them in 1878. Yes, more than this, our sermons which to some extent reflect this feature of the divine program relating to Israel's restoration to divine favor, are being read to a considerable extent by Hebrews as well as by Christians; their eyes are gradually opening, as the scriptures foretell they shall do.

Israel's history as a nation began with the death of Jacob, when he gave his blessing to the 12 tribes. The period from that time to the death of Jesus, according to the scriptures, was 1847 years; and a like period of disfavor, measuring from the day of Jesus' rejection marks the year 1878, as the end of Israel's disfavor—the time when the message of comfort should go forth. However, divine favor was only gradually taken from Israel, and altogether a period of 38 years intervene between the death of Jesus and the utter destruction of Jerusalem. Similarly we should expect that the return of favor would be gradual, a like period of 38 years; and this would bring us to the year 1914, as the time when God's favor for his people will be publicly and openly manifested.

## The Attitude of Expectancy.

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"The public conscience is now being awakened upon this aspect of public morality. Last week I was invited to take part in a meeting organized by men who are not directly connected with any Christian church, but who are sincerely desirous of assisting in the reformation of their countrymen. Their purpose was to start an antigambling league, and with this in mind they called a public meeting, which was attended by some hundreds of Chinese scholars and business men, and resolutions were passed in approved public meeting style, approving of a campaign against the gambling vice. A Chinese Roman Catholic teacher gave a violin solo, a Chinese secretary of the Young Men's Christian association rendered two cornet solos, and a Protestant missionary sang to the gathering. The whole meeting was conducted in so orderly and orthodox a fashion that it was scarcely possible to realize how tremendous a reformation in the whole Chinese outlook upon public life this meeting revealed. Twenty years, even ten years, ago such a meeting would not have been within the realm of possibility. Today we have a class of public moralists arising who have undoubtedly learned from Christianity in their midst the ideals which they are desirous of impressing upon their countrymen."
