GOV. SANDERS

WILL RESIGN SENATORSHIP

The Political Situation in the State the Cause.

Governor Will Make Final Announcement Later.

Baton Rouge, La., Aug. 24.—At a late hour to-night the executive office after Governor Sanders had been closeted with his stenographer in his private office for some time, the announcement was made that to-morrow the governor would have a statement to give out relative to the much discussed question as to whether or not he would remain as governor of the state and serve out his remaining two years as governor, to which he was elected, and resign the United States senatorship, to which he had been elected by the General Assembly following the death of the late Senator McHenry. The governor gave intimation as to what would be contained in his statement. He said that he would have nothing to say to-night, but it is generally accepted in political circles at the capitol that the statement will mean the governor's resignation as United States Senator.

It is reported that a letter will be received here to-morrow by the governor from those deeply interested in the success of the proposed Panama Exposition for New Orleans, urging that he remain at the head of the state government, for the reason that the success of the exposition would plunge the state into a factional fight that would endanger the success of the Panama Exposition project, in which the governor has been greatly interested. For some time the report has been current that the governor would be dispatched from here that many were urging the governor not to accept the United States senatorship, but to remain in Louisiana. The belief has been gaining ground daily that the governor would accede to the request of his friends. This belief to-night has ripened into a practical certainty. The attitude of Lieutenant Governor Lambremont has been an important and perhaps the most important element in the change that has come about, beginning with the extra session last week. If Governor Sanders had resigned as governor, Lieutenant Governor Lambremont would have succeeded to the executive chair. The lieutenant governor had threatened to do some head chopping, at least he is credited in political circles with making these threats. If he had become governor he would, it is believed, have tried to build up a machine with which to have elected himself to the governor's office to succeed himself for the regular term. The political situation would have become complicated for the regulars, and with Secretary Michel, an open candidate for governor against Lambremont, the campaign would have become at once opened. Governor Sanders himself would have remained in the United States Senate for a short time before he would have had to face the people for re-election to the regular term of six years.

It is believed that he has concluded to name some man from north Louisiana for the short term and to take his chances in the 1912 primary for election for the regular term. The name of Judge Thornton, of Rapides, has been suggested as the probable person to be named by the governor for the short term. Several other names have also been mentioned. Governor Sanders' statement to-morrow will be awaited with interest.

PROMULGATION OF ELECTION.

State of Louisiana, Parish of St. Tammany.

BE IT REMEMBERED, That we, the undersigned Board of Supervisors of Election of the Parish of St. Tammany, did this day repair to the Courthouse of said Parish for the purpose of compiling the regular list of the Board of Supervisors of Election at the several polling places in the Second Ward in this Parish, of an election held therein on the 30th day of June, 1910, for a Special School Tax of Five Mills on the Dollar, on all taxable property situated in the Second Ward of the Parish of St. Tammany, State of Louisiana, agreeably to the laws of this State and in pursuance to the proclamation of the Police Jury of the Parish of St. Tammany, State of Louisiana, of date the 16th day of May, 1910, and of the Board of Supervisors of Election, and then and there having arrived, we proceeded in the presence of R. S. Blossman and J. M. Clavier, Jr., witnesses known and hereunto required, and qualified electors of this Parish, and as many other witnesses who have chosen to compile said returns, and have ascertained from said compilation that the votes cast in the several polling places in this Parish at said election for and against the said Special Five-Mill School Tax, are as follows, to-wit:

For said tax, twenty-one (21) votes.

Against said tax, five (5) votes.

Amount of property votes for said tax, nine thousand four hundred and eighty dollars (\$9,480.00).

Amount against the said tax, two thousand two hundred and sixty-two dollars (\$2,262.00).

And having made public proclamation of the above results, we have closed this process verbal of compilation of votes, which is made in triplicate as required by law.
