### A Woman Who Understands Farming Both in Theory and Practice.

Women in many callings hitherto delegated to men have shown a remarkable adaptability to conditions surrounding them, and have attained prominence in opposition to apparently insurmountable obstacles; but it is seldom that a woman of refinement and education has of her own volition taken up the subject of agriculture and prepared herself for the performance of all duties involved. Yet Mrs. Thos. C. Glynn has done this. She has carried off the honors in the agricultural college in competition with men. She has not confined herself to the mastering of text books, but has tilled the soil and grown crops for market, has made herself familiar with the constituents of the soils of this parish, and is further preparing herself for the chosen, in order that she may do demonstration work on agricultural farms. Mrs. Glynn is thoroughly in love with her chosen vocation and is much interested in St. Tammany parish. On her little farm here she was very successful, both in growing of vegetables and the products of her dairy, and it is probable that she will make this the field of her future labors.
