FROM C. M. LITTLE.

Big Time in St. Louis—Meets Cool Weather in Chicago—On to Niagara Falls.

Editor Farmer.

On Tuesday morning, 6th inst., I left the good town of Slidell, in company with my young friend, Karl Seuhauer, of St. Louis, and arrived early Wednesday morning and at 9 o'clock my companion continued on his way to Kansas City. Wednesday I was the guest of Buster Brown and had three auto rides with him. Also dinner with friends, Wilkins, and tonight at A. Bousquet's. The frog-leg-goose-liver eat we all had together there last October.

Left St. Louis Wednesday night, arriving here early Thursday. That same day Col. T. Roosevelt came into town, but did not call on me—his oversight and his loss. Other big guns who have been here recently are Aldermen Newman, Attorney Bollinger and Dr. Polk—and me too. This is the second largest city in the United States, the home of the meat trust, also the great Shears, Sashbury Company. But, what are all these great things, I have had only home and that was on the dining car out of New Orleans.

This city being on Lake Michigan gets any cold weather aloft. A chunk came in last night and to-day wraps and overcoats are in vogue.

Wages are good and union is it. Food prices are reasonable and grocers sell one cent's of potatoes, butter, flour and other goods. A forty page newspaper sells for one cent a copy and bread at three cents a loaf.

I think I'll trolley out to the Clover Hill butter factory to-morrow and see the source of supply in Slidell. It is thirty miles in the country and the street I live on is twenty-seven miles.

Now expect to leave here Monday, and if the spirit moves me, may write again from Detroit or Niagara Falls.

SLIDELL TOWN COUNCIL.

Regular meeting of the Town Council was called to order on the above date.

Present—Paul Gardere, Mayor; J. T. Dubuisson, M. C. Newman, J. T. Liddle, O. R. Brugier.

Moved and seconded that the minutes of the last meeting be adopted as read.

Ordinance No. 111 was put before the council for adoption.

ORDINANCE NO. 111.

An ordinance relative to the collection of delinquent taxes due the town of Slidell for the years 1907, 1908 and 1909, and providing for the collection of same.

Whereas, it appears from the assessment rolls and other records in the office of the secretary and tax collector of the town of Slidell that various property holders have failed to pay the taxes due on said property for the years 1907, 1908 and 1909, as well as the special tax for the erection of the public school house; and whereas, the finances of the town have thereby been curtailed and many public needs have in consequence thereof gone unprovided for now therefore:

Sec. 1. Be it ordained by the Town Council of the town of Slidell, in regular session convened that the tax collector of the town of Slidell is hereby instructed, empowered and authorized to proceed to the collection of all delinquent taxes due the town of Slidell for the years 1907, 1908 and 1909, or anyone or all of said years; that previous to proceedings to collect said delinquent taxes, he shall notify all delinquent tax payers to come forward and pay the taxes due by them for the years 1907, 1908 and 1909, or anyone or all of said years, within twenty days from date of said notice. Said notice shall be in writing and addressed to the delinquent tax payers, and shall show the amount of assessment and amount of taxes due for each of said years. Refreshments will be served by said tax collector on the delinquent tax payers by registered mail, addressed to the last known address of said tax payer.

Sec. 2. Be it further ordained, etc., that after the expiration of said notice, said notice, or as soon thereafter as practicable, counting from the day when last of said notices were mailed, the tax collector shall proceed to advertise for sale the consolidated delinquent tax list under one form as provided for judicial sales, all the property on which the taxes are due, in the form and in the manner as now provided by law for the collection, advertisement and sale of property of delinquent state tax payers, for the nonpayment of state and parish taxes, together with the taxes on said property, shall be certified to by him as collect and shall be filed in the office of the secretary of town, and shall be proof of the service of said notice.

Sec. 3. Be it further ordained, etc., that this ordinance shall go into effect immediately after its promulgation, and after the tax collector shall give notice by publication in the official journal of the town, calling the attention of all the delinquent tax payers and others to the provisions of this ordinance, and notifying them that the collector shall be entitled to collection from said delinquent tax payers the sum of twenty-five cents for costs of said notices and service thereof; and he shall keep an alpha-

THE CENTRAL PHARMACY, LTD.

State of Louisiana, Parish of St. Tammany, Town of Slidell.

Be it known that on this thirteenth day of the month of August, in the year One thousand Nine Hundred and Ten, before me, E. Elmo Bollinger, Notary Public for the parish of St. Tammany, State of Louisiana, personally came and appeared the parties whose names are hereto subscribed, all of full age, and citizens of Slidell, this parish and State, who declare that, availing themselves of the provisions of the laws of this State, relative to corporations, and especially to Act No. 36 of 1888, of the General Assembly of Louisiana, they have covenanted and agreed, and by these presents covenanted and agreed, and bind themselves, as well as such other persons as may

hereafter become associated with them, to form and constitute a corporation and body politic in law, for the purposes and objects, and under the stipulations, articles and conditions following, to-wit:

ARTICLE I. The name and title of this corporation shall be THE CENTRAL PHARMACY, LIMITED, and it domicile is hereby established in the town of Slidell, parish of St. Tammany, State of Louisiana; and under its said corporate name, said corporation shall have power and authority to contract, sue and be sued, to make and use a corporate seal, and the same to break and alter at pleasure, to hold, receive, have purchase, improve, alienate, convey, sell, borrow, pledge, mortgage and hypothecate, under its corporate name, property, real personal and mixed, to name and appoint such officers, directors, agents and managers, and employees as the interest or convenience of said corporation may require; to make and establish by-laws, rules and regulations, for the proper management of its affairs, as may be deemed necessary and proper, and the same to change and alter at pleasure; and to do all other acts and things permitted by law, or shall or may be necessary and proper to carry out the objects and purposes of said corporation.

Said corporation, unless sooner dissolved, in accordance with its charter, shall exist and continue for the period of ninety-nine years from and after the date hereof.

The president, or in his absence, the vice-president shall be the proper persons to whom all citations and other legal process shall be served.

ARTICLE II. The objects and purposes for which this corporation is created, and the nature of the business to be carried on by it, are hereby declared to be:

To operate a retail drug store for the purpose of filling prescriptions, and dealing in all other kind of drugs and medicines, and everything incidental or connected with a first-class up-to-date, progressive, retail drug business.

ARTICLE III. The capital stock of said corporation is hereby fixed at the sum of five thousand (\$5,000.00) dollars, divided into, and represented by fifty (50) shares of the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) each, which shall be paid for in cash, or in the purchase of property, or other services rendered as the board of directors may elect.

All shares shall be fully paid and non-assessable. Any stock-holder may sell, assign or transfer his stock in this corporation, provided thirty days notice of such intention to sell, assign or transfer the same to be given the company, and the other stock-holders thereof shall have the first privilege of purchasing the same after which thirty days notice of the stock may be sold in open market.

The stock of said corporations may be transferred under the above conditions, provided such transfer thereon be made in the books of said company at Slidell, and on surrounding certificates therefor; no transfer of any fractional part of a share shall be made.

This corporation shall commence doing business as soon as twenty-five hundred dollars (\$2,500.00) of the capital stock shall have been subscribed and paid for.

The board of directors shall have the right to designate how much stock shall be issued.

ARTICLE IV. The corporate powers of this company shall be vested in and exercised by a board of three directors, consisting of a president, vice president and secretary, who shall also be the treasurer and manager of said corporation.

Two of said board shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business, and their decisions shall be valid corporate acts; no member of the board of directors to own less than three shares of stock.

The following persons shall constitute the first board of directors: W. T. Trippen, president; Dr. E. P. de Ballard, vice president; J. M. Olivier, secretary-treasurer. During the absence of the president the vice president shall act and preside.

Said board shall continue in office until the first Wednesday in October. One thousand Nine Hundred and Ten, on which date, and thereafter, annually, the board of directors shall be elected on the first Wednesday in October in each year, unless the same should be a holiday, when the election shall be held on the next legal day thereafter.

Notice of such election shall be given at least ten (10) days written notice, mailed at the last known address of every stock-holder; and the board of directors shall appoint one or more stock-holders to preside at such election as commissioners. In the event of failure of any commissioner or commissioners to attend, the president shall, by appointment, fill the vacancy. Any failure from any cause whatever to elect directors the day named for that purpose shall not dissolve the corporation, but the directors then in office, as well as the officers of said company, shall hold over until their successors are chosen. In such event the president shall cause another election to be held within thirty days, and shall give notice thereof as herein before provided.

At every election and meeting each stockholder shall be entitled to vote for each share of stock registered in his name, and may vote by proxy.

The election of directors shall be by ballot, and the majority in amount of votes cast, each share of stock upon to be counted for one vote, shall elect the person or persons for whom they have been cast.

After each election the board of directors shall elect from their own number the officers of said company.

ARTICLE V. The board of directors shall have full power to fill vacancies in their number caused by death, resignation or otherwise, from among the stockholders of the corporation.

The said board shall have full control of the property of this company, and so conduct, manage, and use the same in their discretion, they deem fit, and that is consistent with the objects of this company, or the welfare of same.

The said board is further authorized to frame and adopt such by-laws, rules and regulations as the affairs and business of the corporation may require, and as it may deem necessary for the conducting and management thereof, provided the same shall not conflict with this charter, or with the laws of the State, or the United States.

The said board shall elect or appoint a secretary and such other of-
