FRANKLINTON.

Disperse When Sheriff Promises Speedy Trial for Negro.

Franklinton, La., Sept. 20.—Late last night a mounted mob, numbering nearly two hundred men, assembled at the cemetery on the northern edge of town, having gathered from the vicinity of Warrentown, the scene of the killing of Ed. W. Pierce by a negro named Connelly.

The purpose of the crowd was promptly made known by a delegation sent to interview Joe N. Magee, the sheriff. The delegation let it be known that resistance on the part of the sheriff could easily be overcome.

Sheriff Magee, a tactful officer, sanctioned the delegation to respect the majesty of the law. He told them that some thirty other criminals might be liberated if the jail were broken. He assured them that Judge Burns would order a special session of the court and that a speedy trial would be held.

The delegation reported to the mob that Judge Burns, at Covington, La., would be urged to try Hugh Connelly on the charge of murder at an early date. The mob is said to have declared that execution shall follow the trial.

NEW ORLEANS GIRL ENTANGLED IN UNCLE SAM'S CUSTOMS NET.

New York, Sept. 21.—Miss Clara T. LaPlace, 17 years old, of No. 2013 Palmer Avenue, New Orleans, returned to-day from a tour of Europe with relatives, only to fall into the net spread by customs officers for passengers who attempt to bring in undeclared property to this port.

As the youngest traveler to be taken before George G. Smith, special deputy surveyor, for a hearing in the Customhouse, Miss LaPlace was treated with much lenience, but it is expected that penalty of her offense seizure of six gowns, made in Paris and a gold chain, valued at \$100.

Miss LaPlace, with her aunt, Mrs. E. J. Beltran, and her cousin, Basil Beltran and Miss Hilda Beltran, all of New Orleans, arrived on board the Friedrich der Grosse, of the North German Lloyd Line. The young woman's declaration included \$153 worth of articles, valued at \$153.

When Inspector M. P. Henry discovered several new gowns in her trunk Miss LaPlace admitted, after some questioning, that the gowns had been purchased in Paris and that the gold chain was new. Her trunks were then sent to the appraiser's storehouse, and she was conducted to the Customhouse, with her aunt, where she had a private hearing before Mr. Smith.

Miss Beltran explained to Mr. Smith that her niece had insisted upon making out her own declaration, and had warned Miss LaPlace to take precautions to declare every valuable article.

Miss LaPlace was so headstrong to refuse assistance from me in making her declaration. Mrs. Beltran said, "and has only herself to blame for this serious trouble."

Miss LaPlace was told that she was allowed to pay duty on the would be property she had declared and to take the \$100 worth of goods and free is given, but that to which on the property probably would be seized.
