**COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS.**  
Covington, La., October 4, 1910.  
The Town Council met in regular session on the above date.

Moved by P. J. Lacroix, seconded by M. P. Planche, that the minutes of the last meeting be accepted as read.

The following ordinance was read:

**ORDINANCE.**  
An ordinance prohibiting the washing or cleaning of any automobile, auto car, wagon, jumper, cart, buggy, or other similar vehicle on the streets, alleys or other public ways within the corporate limits of the town of Covington, and providing penalties for the violation of said ordinance.

Sec. 1. Be it ordained by the Mayor and Town Council of the town of Covington, that no person shall

wash or clean by any process whatever any automobile, auto car, wagon, jumper, cart, buggy, carriage, or any similar vehicle on the streets, or any similar public ways within the corporate limits of the town of Covington.

Sec. 2. Be it ordained, etc., That any person found guilty of violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be subjected to a fine not exceeding ten dollars, or imprisonment not exceeding ten days or both at the discretion of the mayor.

Sec. 3. Be it further ordained, etc., That this ordinance shall go into effect from and after its promulgation.

It was moved and duly seconded that above ordinance be adopted as read.

The following ordinance was read:

**ORDINANCE.**  
An ordinance regulating the operation and speed of automobiles, auto cars, or other similar vehicles, within the corporate limits of the town of Covington, and providing penalties for the violation of said ordinance.

Sec. 1. Be it ordained by the Mayor and Town Council of the town of Covington, that no automobile, auto car or other similar vehicle shall be propelled or driven upon or along any street, alley or other public way within the corporate limits of the town of Covington, unless the person in charge or control of such vehicle and acting as the operator thereof, and as such operator, controls the means of propulsion of any such automobile, auto car or any other similar vehicle, shall be a person over the age of sixteen years and who shall first obtain a permit from the secretary of the town and unless said automobile, auto car or other similar vehicle shall bear in a conspicuous place the same number as the permit obtained from the town secretary, made of white metal and not less than four inches in size on a six-inch patent leather background. Said number in all instances shall correspond and conform with the number of the aforesaid permit, a record of which shall be kept on file in the office of the town secretary.

Sec. 2. Be it further ordained, etc., That for the purpose of this ordinance the terms or names automobile, auto car and such other similar vehicles wherever and whenever used in this ordinance shall be held to embrace and mean and is hereby defined to mean any vehicle driven or propelled upon or along the streets, alleys or other public places within the town of Covington, whether for pleasure or business, or both, the motive power of which is electric, compressed air, nautia, gasoline, kerosene or any other motive power, other than animal power, or power supplied by a human being, the muscular exertion of a human being.

Sec. 3. Be it further ordained, etc., That no automobile, auto car or other similar vehicle shall be propelled or driven upon or along any street, alley or public way within the town of Covington, at a speed exceeding ten miles per hour, provided that at street crossings the operator or person in charge of said automobile, auto car or other vehicle shall lessen the rate of speed thereon not to exceed six miles per hour and that when in motion such vehicle shall be so controlled as to observe the rules of the road as laid down for all other vehicles.

Sec. 4. Be it further ordained, etc., That each and every automobile, auto car or other similar vehicle shall be equipped with at least two brakes or sets of brakes, one of which shall be independent of the driving gear of such vehicle. Either of such brakes or sets of brakes shall be of sufficient power, when applied, to stop such vehicle when at a speed of eight miles per hour to a full stop within thirty feet from the point such vehicle was when the brakes were applied, and all such vehicles shall carry a lighted lamp on the front of such vehicle and a lamp on the rear, showing red on the front and white on the figures or numbers whenever in motion, or standing still, on any street, alley or public way, at any time after dusk and before dawn.

Sec. 5. Be it further ordained, etc., That the machinery of any automobile, auto car or other similar vehicle shall be left running when such vehicle is left standing in the street, alley or public way without any attendant.

Sec. 6. Be it further ordained, etc., That any person found guilty of violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be subjected to a fine of not less than five dollars nor more than fifty dollars for each offense or imprisoned not exceeding thirty days or both at the discretion of the Mayor.

Sec. 7. Be it further ordained, etc., That this ordinance shall go into effect from and after its promulgation.

It was moved and duly seconded that above ordinance be adopted as read.

**ORDINANCE NO. 111.**  
An ordinance relative to the collection of delinquent taxes due the town of Slidell for the years 1907, 1908 and 1909, and providing for the collection of same.

Whereas, it appears from the assessment rolls and other records in the office of the secretary and tax collector of the town of Slidell that various property holders have failed to pay the taxes due on said property for the years 1907, 1908 and 1909, as well as the special tax for the erection of the public school house; and whereas, the finances of the town have thereby been curtailed and many public needs have in consequence thereof gone unprovided for now therefore:

Sec. 1. Be it ordained by the Town Council of the town of Slidell, in regular session convened, that the tax collector of the town of Slidell is hereby instructed, empowered and authorized to proceed to the collection of all delinquent taxes due the town of Slidell for the years 1907, 1908 and 1909, as per assessment roll of the town for said respective years; that previous to proceedings to collect delinquent taxes, he shall notify all delinquent tax payers to come forward and pay the taxes due by them for the years 1907, 1908 and 1909, or anyone or all of said years, within twenty days from date of a said notice. Said notice shall be in writing and added to the list of delinquent tax payers, and shall show the amount of assessment and amount of taxes due for each of said years. Said notice shall be served by said tax collector on the delinquent tax payers by registered mail, addressed to the last known address of said tax payer.

Sec. 2. Be it further ordained, etc., that after the expiration of said twenty days notice, or as soon thereafter as practicable, counting from the day when last of said notices were mailed, the tax collector shall proceed to advertise for sale the consolidated delinquent tax list under one form, as provided for judicial sales, all the property on which the taxes are due, in the form and in the manner as now provided by law for the collection, advertisement and sale of property of delinquent state tax payers, for the nonpayment of state and parish taxes, together with the registry receipts, which list shall be certified to by him as collect and shall be filed in the office of the secretary of town, and be the proof of the service of said notice.

Sec. 3. Be it further ordained, etc., that this ordinance shall go into effect immediately after its promulgation, and after the tax collector shall give notice by publication in the official journal of the town, calling the attention of all the delinquent tax payers and others to the provisions of this ordinance, and notifying them within ten days after its promulgation that he will enforce it provisions thereon.

Sec. 4. Be it further ordained, etc., that the collector shall be entitled to collection from said delinquent tax payers the sum of twenty-five cents as costs of said notices and service thereof; and he shall keep an alphabetical list of all delinquent tax payers so notified by him.

**ORDINANCE NO. 112.**  
An ordinance relative to the deplorable condition of the New Orleans and Northeastern railroad depot at Slidell, and authorizing the attorney to institute proceedings before the Louisiana railroad commission to compel the New Orleans and Northeastern railroad company to build a suitable depot and improve the undesirable condition.

Whereas, it appears that the New Orleans and Northeastern railroad depot at this place is old and entirely inadequate for the need of the public and the volume of business done therein; and whereas, the deplorable condition in and around said depot has injured the business of the town and been detrimental to the welfare and safety of the citizens of Slidell and the traveling public; and whereas, the demands of the Mayor and Board of Aldermen have heretofore been ignored by the officials of the said railroad company, now therefore:

Be it ordained by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the Town of Slidell, in regular session convened, that E. Elmo Bollinger, town attorney of the town of Slidell, is hereby instructed, empowered and authorized to proceed to institute proceedings before Louisiana railroad commission against the New Orleans and Northeastern railroad company to compel them to erect a suitable depot within the corporate limits of the town of Slidell, and to remedy the deplorable conditions that exist around the present depot.

Be it further ordained that this ordinance shall go into effect immediately upon and after its passage.

**Charter of THE CENTRAL PHARMACY, LTD.**  
State of Louisiana,  
Parish of St. Tammany,  
Town of Slidell.

day of the month of August, 1910. Be it known that on the thirteenth day of the month of August, 1910, the year One Thousand Nine Hundred and Ten, before me, E. Elmo Bollinger, Notary Public for the parish of St. Tammany, State of Louisiana, personally came and appeared the parties whose names are hereto subscribed, of full age and citizens of Louisiana, this parish and State, who declare that, availing themselves of the provisions of the laws of this State, relative to corporations, and especially to Act No. 36 of 1888, they have covenanted and agreed, and by those presents covenanted and agreed, and bind themselves, as well as such other persons as may hereafter become associated with them to form and constitute a corporation and body politic in law, for the purposes and objects, and under the stipulations, articles and conditions following, to-wit:

**ARTICLE I.**  
The name and title of this corporation shall be THE CENTRAL PHARMACY, LIMITED, and its domicile is hereby established in the town of Slidell, parish of St. Tammany, State of Louisiana; and under its said corporate name, said corporation shall have power and authority to contract, sue and be sued, to make and use a corporate seal, and the same to be used, after its pleasure, to hold, receive, have, purchase, prove, alienate, convey, sell, borrow, pledge, mortgage and hypothecate, under its corporate name, property, real personal and mixed, to name and appoint such officers, directors, agents and clerks as it may deem necessary as the interest or convenience of said corporation may require; to make and establish by-laws, rules and regulations, for the proper management of its affairs, as may be deemed necessary and proper, and the same to change and alter at pleasure; and to do all other acts and things permitted by law, or shall or may be necessary and proper to carry out the objects and purposes of said corporation.

Said corporation, unless sooner dissolved, in accordance with its charter, shall exist and continue for the period of ninety-nine years from and after the date hereof.

The president, or in his absence, the vice-president shall be the proper persons to receive and station and other legal process shall be served.

**ARTICLE II.**  
The objects and purposes
