

Prize Fight Held Under Cover Raided by Police.

Chicago, Nov. 8.—A gathering advertised as a political rally last night turned out to be a prize fight. The fight got well under way in a barn at the corner of West Fifty-ninth street and South Paula street before the police raided the place and arrested 300 men, including principals and a prominent politician.

A ring had been roped off in a stable. The men were scheduled to fight to a finish and had taken their corners and excited spectators were crowded about the improvised ring. The raid was conducted by Lieutenant John Ryan, of the Englewood Police Station. Plain clothes men and policemen from a dozen of the South Side stations surrounded the barn, and at a preconcerted signal closed in on the fake political meeting.

In place on an address on political issues, they found a referee introducing the fighters and announcing the rules of the fight. Ryan shouted to the crowd that every man in the place was under arrest and ordered the fight stopped. Scores of men rushed for other portions of the stable, but found every exit guarded by one or two policemen.

A dozen patrol wagons were at the doors and the men arrested were loaded in and taken to the Englewood Station, where they were booked. Two hundred men and boys were waiting outside the building, seeking to purchase tickets. These escaped arrest when the raid was made.

The men scheduled to fight were "Young" Ketchel and Mikey Sheridan. Both men had thrown off their bath robes and were in the center of the ring when Ryan's men entered the place.
