## MEETING OF POLICE JURY

### Sheriff's Report for October Collections \$1099.87.

### New Dog License Enactment Read and Laid Over.

### The Parish Fair Association Again Discussed.

### The Nine Members of Jury to be on the Board.

### List of Bills Approved and Ordered Paid.

Covington, La., Nov. 21, 1910.  
The Police Jury met in regular session on the above date and remained in session one day.  
Present—Geo. Koepf, Jr., president; M. Fitzgerald, Geo. Bierhorst, Crawford Williams, A. D. Crawford, J. J. Cusachs, B. A. Schneider and J. W. Decker.  
Absent—Herman Schultz.  
The following act was read:  
ACT NO. 198.  
House Bill No. 322.  
To authorize the Police Juries throughout the State of Louisiana to impose a license upon dogs, to enforce the same by penalties, and to devote the proceeds of said licenses to education.  
Section 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Louisiana, That the Police Juries throughout the State be and they are hereby authorized and empowered and shall impose an annual license tax upon all dogs in their respective parishes and make regulations and to impose such penalties as they may deem fit to enforce the collection of said tax.  
Section 2. Be it further enacted, etc., That no license shall be imposed for a greater sum than two dollars.  
Section 3. Be it further enacted, etc., That the payment of the license herein provided for shall constitute as property the dog upon which it is paid.  
Section 4. Be it further enacted, etc., That all licenses and penalties granted, less necessary costs of collection, shall be turned over by the different Police Juries to the respective School Boards of the parish in which the license and penalties are collected.  
On motion, duly seconded, the above Act was laid over till next regular meeting.  
It was moved and duly seconded that the Police Jury make a donation of \$100.00 to the Eye, Ear, Nose and Throat Hospital.  
Carried.  
It is moved and seconded that the \$2,500.00 which the Police Jury has agreed to donate to the St. Tammany Fair and Experiment Farm Association will be paid and delivered to the association on the following grounds:  
First, That the land of said association and all improvements thereon, shall become the property of the Parish of St. Tammany, as full owner-ship, whereas the said association ceases to use the land and imp. and the same is to be sold for the purpose for which the said association is organized.  
Second, Said money is to be paid and delivered said company as soon as \$7000.00 of the capital stock of said company is subscribed and paid in.  
Third, That the business and corporate powers of said company shall be transacted by a board of directors composed of 18 persons, 9 of whom shall be members of the Police Jury of the Parish of St. Tammany.

## PARISH FAIR ASSOCIATION

### Matters Discussed at Meeting Held Monday Night.

### Committee Appointed to Locate Suitable Site.

### Also to Estimate Cost of the Necessary Buildings.

### Prison Labor Will Be Used On Experiment Farm.

### Committees Will Report at Meeting Next Tuesday.

The Parish Fair Association held a meeting in the courthouse Tuesday evening. The meeting was informal, and the discussion was general as to whether it was best to include in the plans the installation of race track, baseball park, golf links, etc., in connection with the fair buildings and experimental farm or to simply have an experimental farm. Mr. Harvey E. Ellis, who is the originator of the idea of the parish fair, and who presided at the meeting, made an excellent talk showing the advantages such a fair would be to the parish and it was after this talk that the discussion came up as to the advisability of undertaking the whole program. Mr. G. E. Millar expressed himself as doubtful if the undertaking could be carried through with the funds provided, and thought that it would be better to simply have an experimental farm, but simply as to whether the means were sufficient for both. He did not, however, offer any figures showing what the cost would be for such a fair. Mr. Koepf, president of the association, stated to prevail that there would be sufficient funds for carrying out the original program. In order that there might be no further doubt on the subject a committee of three, P. E. Theriot, P. J. Lacroix and A. R. Smith, were appointed to find a situation for the fair within a mile or two of Covington, conveniently situated, and the cost of fifty acres of land, and also to get an estimate of the cost of building necessary structures, race track, etc.  
Messrs. E. Davis, L. M. Bourgeois and H. D. Bulloch were appointed a committee on subscriptions.  
President Geo. Koepf, Jr., of the Police Jury, spoke enthusiastically of the project, and stated that every member of the jury was impressed with the benefit of such an association. He said that before the matter of organizing a fair association came up he had been thinking of putting an experimental farm at Madisonville; but now that the association has been formed he felt that every one in the parish should be interested and help to make it a success. For his part he was body and soul in favor of it and would do what he could to help it along. Mr. Koepf received applause for his remarks, and an evident appreciation of what a fair would mean to the parish.  
According to action taken by the Police Jury at their meeting on last Monday, the nine members of that body will become members of the board of directors of the association. Mr. Koepf explained the action of that body in this respect by stating that the members of the police jury were servants of the people; that in this instance they were spending the money of the people and would exercise greater care than if they were acting in fear mismanagement of jeopardizing the parish funds.  
Mr. Koepf also stated that the road machinery of the parish could be used in constructing the race track at a minimum cost. As for the labor required to work the experimental farm, he said that could also be supplied at light cost by working the parish prisoners on the farm.  
All the speakers seemed enthusiastic and that the association promises to be organized under very favorable circumstances.  
The next meeting of the stockholders will be held at the courthouse Tuesday evening, November 29, at 8 o'clock, when committees will report and charter be accepted.

## Charter of THE LOUISIANA INVESTMENT COMPANY.

United States of America,  
State of Louisiana,  
Parish of St. Tammany.  
On this, the 22d day of the month of October, 1910, before me, Lewis L. Morgan, a notary public, in and for the parish of St. Tammany, State of Louisiana, personally came and appeared the undersigned parties and declared that they had hereby formed themselves into a corporation for the term of ninety-nine years from this date, under the name of the Louisiana Investment Company, the domicile whereof shall be in the town of Covington, parish of St. Tammany, Louisiana, and the purposes whereof shall be to finance deals in real estate, stocks, bonds and other securities; to borrow and lend money, to buy and sell property, real or personal, to act as trustee in bankruptcy or as receiver or liquidator of individuals or corporations or as agent for corporations or individuals, to act as a depository, and to guarantee the value of property and to audit and guarantee accounts. No stockholder shall be held liable for any of the debts or obligations of said company, except the amount that may be due by each stockholder for the unpaid balance of his subscription to the stock of said company.  
Citation and other process shall be served upon the president, and in his absence upon the secretary-treasurer.  
The capital shall be one hundred thousand (\$100,000) dollars, divided into shares of one hundred (\$100.00) dollars each, payable twenty-five (\$25.00) dollars cash, and the balance to-wit, the sum of seventy-five (\$75.00) dollars in monthly installments of fifteen (\$15.00) dollars each until final payment, and the corporation shall begin business as soon as five thousand (\$5,000.00) dollars of the capital stock shall have been subscribed. The affairs of the corporation shall be managed by the board of directors composed of five stockholders, the first board of directors to hold office until the first Monday in December, 1911, and thereafter to be elected annually, by ballot, or as soon thereafter as possible. Each share of stock shall have one vote cast in person or by proxy. The first board of directors shall be composed of Jos. Delery, president; A. J. Planché, vice president; E. J. Domergue, Jr., secretary-treasurer; J. S. Watkinson and J. S. Jones, and succeeding boards shall elect officers from among their number.  
This charter may be amended or this corporation dissolved by a three-fourths vote of the stock represented at a meeting, held after ten days notice in writing, mailed to the stockholders, and in case of dissolution the board of directors shall act as liquidators. The board of directors will have the power to adopt by-laws for the general management of the affairs of the corporation, and can amend same at their pleasure.
