
## FRANKLINTON.

**Lumber Company Made Defendant in Suit of \$60,000.**  
Franklinton, La., Feb. 24.—Attorneys Gordon W. Goodbee and Herman E. Gayer, of this place, representing George W. Seal, of Varnado, have filed suit against the Great Southern Lumber Company D. H. Hinson and Robert Carson to recover \$60,000 damages. Petitioner relates that on March 1, 1910, while walking on the public streets of Bogalusa, an unincorporated town belonging to defendant company, in company with Archie Varnado, Claude Gann and James M. Gann, on their way from the incorporated town of Richardson to the railroad depot at Bogalusa, he was unexpectedly shot, bruised and attacked by Hinson and Carson, and was locked up and made to suffer from bodily pains and in humiliation. Petitioner recites that as Hinson and Carson were employed by the company as police, and were cared for, provided with counsel and assisted in procuring bail by the company, the latter is made co-defendant.  
A few days ago the widow of James M. Gann filed suit against the same defendants for \$155,000 for killing her husband.  
During the last several days, in response to a proclamation of Mayor Branch, the citizens have been busy cleaning up their premises, and await with pride the visit of the health train.
