THE KINGS DAUGHTERS.

Preparing for the Convention to be Held in Hammond, April 28-30, 1911.

It was decided at the meeting of the King's Daughters held last Monday to give a picture show entertainment on the 24th of April, part of the proceeds of which will go to help Rest Awhile and part for the use of the order for work at home.

The president, Mrs. Preston Burns, and Mrs. Wm. Bodebender will attend the convention of the Louisiana branch of the International Order of Kings' Daughters and Sons to be held in Hammond, La., April 28-30, 1911, as delegates from the home circle.

Memorial services will be held at the Saturday night session of the convention for those members who have "entered into rest," since the last convention, and a list of the names of those who have departed from the home circle will be forwarded to the secretary. Invitations have been extended to circles in Mississippi and Alabama to attend.

Mrs. B. C. Whitney, of Detroit, Mich., and Mrs. Ira Parsons, State secretary, will address the convention. A special feature will be a question box, in which may be placed all questions to be answered for the good of the order. The round trip from New Orleans will be \$2.25, and special coaches will be provided on the 9:15 a. m. train, Friday, April 28, and at the same hour Saturday morning for those who wish to spend the day in Hammond. All property accredited delegates will be the guests of the Hammond Circle, and it is hoped that this will be the best convention held, as the order is desirous of increasing its work in this section of the country. All circles must pay \$3.00 a year towards the expenses of the convention.

All delegates must present to the convention regular credentials from the bodies they represent. Circles from A to G, inclusive, will report the first session; circles from H to N, inclusive, second session; circles from O onward, third session. Reports should be typewritten. Reports will be limited to three minutes each and must contain: 1. a general sketch of the work done by the circle; 2. a financial statement of money raised; and 3. incidental data relative to the work of the circle.
