FARM TOTES OF INTEREST

Extracts from Bulletin of L. S. U. of Agriculture.

What the Rock Island is Doing for the Farmers.

The Farmers' Demonstration Work in Louisiana.

Value of Rapid and Intensive Cultivation.

THE ROCK ISLAND EXHIBIT CAR.

An agricultural exhibit car, designated as "The Diversified Farming and Boys' Corn Club Car," was operated by the college of agriculture of the Louisiana State University on the Louisiana line of the Rock Island Railway from March 15 to 30, 1911. The car was furnished by the Rock Island and transported free of charge. The equipment was furnished by the college, and consisted of forage crops, exhibits of twelve leading varieties of corn grown in the State, seeds of all plants specially adapted to the raising of live stock, jars containing soil systems with nitrogen gathering nodules of the clovers, exhibits of organs showing lesions of hog cholera and bovine tuberculosis, samples of hog worms, mounted specimens of insects and animals, samples of rice, rice and corn products, and fertilizers. The car was decorated with instructive photographs of the leading breeds of hogs, dairy and beef cattle, dairies, portable fences, corn breeding blocks, gatherings at the winter farmers' short courses, views of the University, etc.

The car made fourteen stops, spending a day at each place. Visitors to the cars had the entire exhibit explained, and meetings of farmers were held at each point and lectures were delivered by members of the college staff and representatives of the Farmers' Demonstration Work. Special talks were made to the boys' of the corn clubs, and boys' pig clubs were organized at Mamou, Pine Prairie, LaCompe, Lamourie, Wauville, Bayou, Thoro, Quinan, Ruston, Dulac, Bernice and Lillie. The total membership of the pig clubs organized on the route is 145. Those who accompanied the car and lectured are Prof. W. R. Dodson, V. L. Roy, R. C. Howell, J. B. Garrett, S. E. McClelland and Maxey, of the Farmers' Demonstration Work.

The operation of this car is regarded as an unqualified success. While the attendance was not as large as on the occasion of the agricultural train operated in February—the total attendance being 3,750—it is believed that it will prove to be of more substantial benefit. The time allotted to each stopping place gave opportunity for discussing the immediate problems of the farmers and of dealing at greater length with such problems as crop diversification, forage crops, cotton and corn growing, stock raising, tick eradication, feeds and feeding.

THE FARMERS' DEMONSTRATION WORK IN LOUISIANA.

Probably very few people realize what a vast amount of good is being done for our State through the agency of the Farmers' Co-Operative Demonstration Work of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, under the direction of Mr. J. A. Evans, State Agent, and his assistant, Mr. Mason Snowden. The local agents are, in the parish of St. Tammany, the department on their monthly rounds. The following data, taken from a letter received from Mr. Snowden, make clear the vast significance of the work.

The demonstration work in 1910 in Louisiana had 1430 cotton demonstrators who cultivated 12,789 acres in cotton. The average production per acre, including all types of Louisiana soils, was 781 pounds of seed cotton, while the general average for the State was only 390 pounds. This means that if every acre of land planted to cotton here last year had been planted and cultivated according to demonstration methods, our cotton crop would have been about 520,000 bales, and the increase in value on a basis of \$80 per bale including the seed, would have been \$20,000,000. The 117 cotton demonstrators, cultivating 949 acres, obtained an average yield of 35.2 percent more than the average of the State. Had all the farmers made as much corn per acre as did the demonstrators, Louisiana's corn crop for 1910 would have been 88,000,000 bushels instead of 58,825,000 bushels. Apart from the demonstrators, about 6000 co-operators were engaged in the work, following to a certain extent the same instructor and methods as those of the demonstrators, but from whom no reports are required.

Wherever practiced, the demonstration work also encourages the growing of hay and other forage crops, the raising of live stock, the growing of legumes, and the use of the fertilizer of the soil. The building of the fertility of the soil is a part of the Farmers' Co-Operative Demonstration Work, and is done under the direction of a special agent in co-operation with the parish superintendents.

When the full meaning of the demonstration work comes to be understood by all the farmers of the State, the demand for one or more local agents in each parish will be made so clear that every police jury will respond to the demand and co-operate with the U. S. Department of Agriculture in any case, such as the raising of live stock, the growing of a small part of the farmers' taxes.

RAPID AND INTENSIVE CULTIVATION.

At the present stage of the corn crop of Louisiana, and during the next two months in the growth of cotton, nothing will contribute more to good yields than frequent shallow cultivation. It requires less work to run over a plot twice with the harrow and once with the cultivator than it does to have to off-bar the crop, hoe it out, and throw a furrow to the plant. Weeds are easiest kept down by being destroyed when they first come up. Shallow, but frequent, cultivation does this; and the first cultivation required is harrowing before the crop comes up and again a week later, and again a third time. This insures better crops and means greater profits to the farmer. It is needless to add that the farmer who uses a two-row cultivator with two horses, riding instead of walking, saves land for himself, saves money, accomplishes more work and enjoys life more than he would by wasting his time walking behind a little one-horse implement. More team work and relatively less human labor is one of our great needs.
