## WHAT GOOD CITIZENSHIP MEANS.

A man may be moral, of good character and law-abiding, and still be a citizen of very little value to a community. The man who does not vote because it is too much trouble, or because he fears he will make enemies, or because he thinks it is useless to oppose what he does not approve, commits sins of omission more damaging than the sins of commission of the lawless citizen who laughs at restraint and holds law in contempt, because the lawless citizen becomes a practical demonstrator of the necessity for execution of the law, while the inaction of the other weakens opposition to corruption secretly and unobserved. So it is the same with the citizen who has not civic pride enough to enter into the schemes of his fellow citizens for the progress of his town or of his parish. He accepts whatever benefits are to be derived from the efforts of others, but he assumes none of the responsibilities or burdens. If each would do his share, or in other words, if each would do in accordance with his ability to do, the share of each in the stock of his community would be much more valuable for not being watered by indifference.

The recent movement of the citizens of Abita Springs to raise funds for advertising St. Tammany parish shows a spirit that if emulated by every town in the parish would put in the treasury for that purpose four or five thousand dollars within a week. Within half an hour after the object of the meeting had been declared \$247.50 had been subscribed. This money was subscribed not to advertise Abita Springs, but to advertise St. Tammany parish, and a committee was appointed to confer with officials and citizens of other towns to secure co-operation and to raise a sufficient fund to extend the advertising over a field that may bring results and be of benefit.

There is no doubt that this section offers opportunities that would be eagerly taken advantage of if presented in a proper light to the people of the North and West. Canada has been successful in drawing people from the United States to settle on her lands, which will not yield one-half the profits per acre, by catchy advertising. If we wish people to come here we must make known our advantages, and we can only do this by advertising.

## THE FIREMEN'S CONVENTION.

Covington is one of the prettiest towns in the State of Louisiana. As a convention city it offers many inducements for both summer and winter, having suitable places for open air or closed-in sittings, water that is pure and unwholesome to those most susceptible to changes, wide avenues and streets for vehicles or parades and people that are congenial, sociable and willing to entertain. We believe the firemen and their friends enjoyed themselves while here and that the business of the convention brought out new ideas that may be of benefit to the firemen of Louisiana in their future development.

The value of the association to the State of Louisiana can not be fully realized without an investigation into the conditions from which relief is sought. There is no doubt that a large percentage of the loss from fire is preventable by proper precaution and conformity to plans of building found necessary under modern ways of living and transacting business. Such defects as need amending are brought out in discussion by men who are daily face to face with the difficulties of conquering fire, and who have an insight into the causes. It is therefore of the utmost importance that public interest should be attracted to these conventions in order that co-operation may be secured among the citizens and the means be provided for carrying into effect the measures found necessary.

The advice given by Rev. E. A. Rennie before the convention was good and seemed to meet the approval of all. It was that trained and experienced lecturers be employed to present the matters to be brought up in clear and interesting form, or even to have the lectures illustrated by slides, giving a graphic and impressive lesson. In this way interest will be awakened that will lead to better support by municipalities, more interest by the public at large and better opportunity for securing such State legislation as may be necessary to carry out the plans of the department. All the companies should join the State association. If kept clean of politics, it will ultimately be of great benefit to the State.

## PASTE IT IN YOUR HAT—THERE NEGRO ATTACKS 12-YEAR-OLD GIRL IN MONEY IN BEANS.

Seed—Get the best; there is no use wasting time planting poor seed. For wax beans, either "Wadwells' Kidney Wax" or "Hudson's Kidney Wax." Cost \$6.00 per bushel.

Green beans—"Early Black Valentine" at \$5.00 per bushel.

Time of planting—As early as possible. If cut down by frost, replant at once. If you can spare the time plant in the fall and use the product for your own seed in the spring, but do not use the first beans and leave the last for seed.

You want to be early, so save the first and make up your mind that you will plant for seed. Give the method adopted for planting. I made a success of it, and when other had to stop picking for rust and spotted beans I was able to ship right on, except in the middle of one plot that I had planted too close. I did not hill up enough, allowed them to remain flat, and as the result the heavy rain we had about the middle of April fired the lot.

Planting—Rows 2 1/2 feet apart, about 2 inches deep in a continuous row, planting as fast as you can walk, dropping the beans close together. I note that planting in hills 18 inches apart as the Station recommends does not give the shade and shelter required by wax beans. **Bogalusa Black is Saved From Mob by Wild Ride on Train—Sheriff Gets Prisoner Safely to Jail at Franklinton.**

Bogalusa, La., May 29.—Caught after an attempted assault on the twelve-year-old daughter of Dr. Ball, escaping, recaptured after a few hours' chase, turned over to the sheriff and finally saved from a mob by a wild ride on a locomotive, John Cox, a negro, to-night is safe in the parish jail at Franklinton.

Only Sheriff Wiley Magee's resourcefulness prevented a lynching. The mob had formed and had provided itself with ropes and revolvers. The sheriff chartered a locomotive by telephone, spirited the negro to the yards, climbed aboard with him and set out in pursuit of the local freight train which left here this morning. Overtaking the train, the negro was put aboard and taken to Rio, the junction point, where the sheriff took the regular train to Franklinton.

Dr. Ball and his wife were absent yesterday evening. Cox was employed about the place. He entered the house and began blowing out the lamps. The physician's son, who is fourteen years old, told the negro to get out, and the twelve-year-old daughter of the doctor hid herself under the couch. The negro began searching for her, and in the darkness overturned several pieces of furniture. Neighbors heard the noise, and were on their way to see what was wrong, when the doctor returned. With the aid of his son and his brother, Dr. Ball caught the negro.

Dr. Ball then left to get the sheriff, and the negro escaped from the house. He was recaptured later.

A story spread from Pleasant Hill, the suburb in which the incident occurred, to Bogalusa, and this morning a mob formed. Sheriff Magee was warned and made the arrangements for the locomotive and got his prisoner away safely.

This is the first case of attempted assault in Bogalusa. Feeling runs very high.
