**MILKING BY MACHINERY.**

In a business where the margin of profit is as close as in dairying, every saving in the cost of production becomes necessary and should be looked to by dairymen who wish to make a success of it. Labor is one of the highest costs of milk production, and to lessen this cost machinery is being introduced to take the place of hand milking. The editor made a visit to the dairy of Mr. Geo. E. Sears last Saturday to watch the Hinam apparatus do its work. This machine consists of four cups with rubber tubes attached. These cups are made in different sizes so as to fit the teats of any cow and are held in place by suction, the air being exhausted in the tubes, which are attached to a portable 5-gallon can. The suction is not continuous, but is alternating or peristaltic, and resembles the process of hand-milking, and judging from the action of the cattle, was not displeasing to them. The power for this milking was furnished by a small gasoline engine. The length of time required to milk each cow was from five to seven minutes, and one man can attend to the milking of four or five cows at a time, requiring about ten minutes. The process seems very satisfactory and is certainly a great saving of labor, and has the advantage of being sanitary, as the cans are kept closed and the milk does not come in contact with the open air of the stables.
