AN OBJECT LESSON IN TRUCKING

Under the management of Mr. G. L. Tibout of the Experiment Station staff, a truck farm has been established on the north side of University Lake at Baton Rouge. This station alone might not be of much interest to truck gardeners, but certain features of this farm give it practical importance and interest. One of the objects in establishing the farm is to produce vegetables for the use of the University mess hall. The remainder of the output of the farm is to be shipped to northern markets. This will offer opportunity to study the important problems of marketing truck at distant points—problems which constantly confront market gardeners and the correct solution of which frequently spells success or failure. The result of practice in vegetable production, and should prove of great value.

But probably the most interesting feature of this truck farm lies in the irrigation plant that has been installed. A 12-horsepower gasoline engine is used; the supply of water comes from the lake; it is lifted about 20 feet through a 6-inch pipe to the highest point on the farm; between 300 and 400 gallons of water are supplied per minute to the main irrigation ditch. From this main, the water is conducted into the several parts of the farm, the furrowsystem of irrigation being used. The entire plant has been installed by the help on the farm, showing that such installation does not require the service of experts.

The crops now growing on the farm are Irish potatoes, cauliflower, cabbage, onions, egg-plants and tomatoes. These staple crops will offer an opportunity to study the diseases common to such crops in Louisiana, and thus prove of inestimable benefit to the market gardeners of Louisiana. Persons interested are invited to visit the farm any time.—Department of Agricultural Extension, Louisiana State University.

CHARTER OF MACKIE PINE PRODUCTS COMPANY.

United States of America, State of Louisiana, Parish of St. Tammany.

Be it known, that on this seventh day of June in the year of our Lord, one thousand nine hundred and eleven, before me, B. M. Miller, a notary public, duly appointed and qualified, in and for the parish of St. Tammany, State of Louisiana, and in the presence of the undersigned witnesses, personally came and appeared the several persons whose names are hereunto subscribed, residents of the parish of St. Tammany and of the city of New Orleans, who severally declared that, availing themselves of the laws of this State, in such cases made and provided, they have formed and organized, and by these presents do organize themselves into a corporation and body corporate for the objects and purposes, and under the stipulations following, to-wit:

ARTICLE I.

The name and title of this corporation shall be MACKIE PINE PRODUCTS COMPANY, and its domicile shall be in the town of Covington, St. Tammany parish, Louisiana. It shall exist for the term of ninety-nine years from the date hereof, and by that name sue and be sued, and contract, and enjoy any and all privileges and powers under the laws of the State of Louisiana.

ARTICLE II.

The objects and purposes for which this corporation is established, and the nature of the business to be carried on by it, are, to produce, manufacture, buy and sell turpentine, resin, naval stores, and wood derivation saw mills, and to sell the lives and products of all kinds; to sell tea products and residue or waste thereof, or to further use and manufacture the same, and to mill stump, and clear lands, whether in connection with other vessels in connection with the carrying on of its business and general or special stockholders, or in connection with the operation of the business above mentioned.

The president, or in his absence or inability to act, the vice president, or, in case of his absence or inability to act, the secretary shall be the proper person upon whom all citations or legal process shall be served.

ARTICLE IV.

The capital stock of this corporation is hereby fixed at the sum of fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000.00), divided into five hundred shares of the par value of one hundred dollars each. Said shares of stock shall be paid for by the subscribers thereto as shall be required by the board of directors, and the stock may be issued in payment of property acquired by the corporation or in compensation for services rendered, but in no case shall any of the stock be sold or disposed of for less than par value. This corporation shall be authorized to begin business as soon as five thousand dollars of the capital stock shall have been subscribed for.

ARTICLE V.

All the powers of this corporation shall be vested in a board of directors, composed of not less than five stockholders. They shall be elected on the first Monday in June of each year, commencing June, 1912, at a general meeting convened for that purpose, after ten days previous notice in writing to each stockholder owning stock standing in his name in the books of the corporation, and until such time the following stockholders are hereby named as first board of directors, and who shall hold their office and exercise their functions until their successors are elected, viz: Henry A. Mackie, Elmer E. Wood, Edward J. Frederick and Elie P. Singletary; of whom H. A. Mackie shall be president, E. J. Frederick shall be vice president, and Elie P. Singletary shall be secretary and treasurer. The same person may hold the offices of secretary and treasurer, or each of such offices may be held by a different person.

The election of the board of directors shall be by ballot, and each stockholder shall be entitled to one vote, either in person or by proxy, for each share of stock owned by him, and a majority of the votes cast shall elect. The board of directors shall, immediately after their election, elect from their number, a president, a vice president, a secretary and a treasurer, or a secretary-treasurer.

The said board of directors shall elect and employ any and all employees, managers and clerks of the corporation they may deem necessary for the proper conduct of its business, and may fix their compensation, and remove or dismiss them at pleasure.

ARTICLE VI.

This charter may be amended or altered by the stockholders, at a general meeting convened for that purpose, after ten days written notice to each stockholder, if this corporation may be dissolved with the consent of two thirds of the capital stock represented at such a meeting. In case of dissolution, the affairs of the corporation shall be closed and liquidated, as rapidly as possible, by two of three liquidators appointed or elected by the stockholders at meeting. The capital stock of this corporation may be increased or diminished in accordance with the laws of the State of Louisiana, on the subject of altering the capital stock of corporations.

ARTICLE VII.

The subscribers hereto have respectively stated opposite their signatures hereto the number of shares of the capital stock subscribed to by them respectively, constituting the same subscriptions made by the incorporators for the purpose of organizing this corporation.

ARTICLE VIII.

No stockholder shall be liable or responsible for the contracts or faults of this corporation in any further sum than the unpaid balance due to the corporation, on the shares owned by him, or shall any mere informality in organization have effect of rendering this charter null or of exposing a stockholder to liability beyond the amount of his unpaid stock, if any.
