BRIDGE ACROSS THE LAKE

Continued from first page.

We must not forget that the people of New Orleans now pay a heavy tax to reach this favored region, for the benefit of their afflicted ones, in unnecessary mileage, and a heavier tax in the loss of time. How much this tax amounts to one can only approximate by comparing the existing mileage to Covington by rail of 58 miles at a cost of \$3.30 for the regular fare round trip, with a proposed mileage of 30 miles and a possible fare of \$1 for the regular round trip and say 50 cents for excursions, making the run to Covington say in one hour or less instead of 2 1/2 to 3 hours, as at present. Too little attention is given the money loss involved in the accumulated loss of time of large communities in reaching each other by circuitous routes, not to mention the loss of actual money due to paying for unnecessary mileage.

We ask you to consider also whether it is not possible by development of this natural suburb of New Orleans, to transform into a winter resort for the people of the North, attracted to it by its equable climate, its ozone-laden atmosphere filled with the aroma of the pines, its resources of stream and forest, its incomparable water, its natural beauty and above all its close proximity to a city which will soon be one of the world's great emporiums of trade, and where within the hour one may leave his home and put his finger on the beating pulse of the country's commerce.

We do not underestimate the difficulties attendant upon this enterprise, but we are greatly reassured on reflecting that nature has interposed no obstacle but a short distance and a lake of shallow depth. The question is one solely of money, but we are confident that our people are willing to exhaust every resource within their reach, and with your assistance and the help of the State of Louisiana and of the Federal Government, we are confident of the ultimate result.

Whereas, in this era of quick transportation, it is found necessary to shorten distances between peoples and communities, in order to facilitate a quicker and freer intercourse; and

Whereas, the Parish of St. Tammany is separated from Parish of Orleans by Lake Pontchartrain, a body of water which no point has more than 20 feet of water, with an average of only ten feet; and

Whereas, the building of a railroad and automobile bridge across said Lake Pontchartrain presents no engineering difficulties of any consequence, but is solely a question of money, expediency, and

Whereas, the territory lying north of said lake and readily accessible by means of said bridge is a region of vast extent, rich in natural beauty, and in resources of field and forest, enjoying a balmy climate, dry air, and a purer and fresher atmosphere; and

Whereas, Almighty God appears to have placed this natural barrier in the way of the greatest city of the South for some wise and beneficent purpose; therefore

Be it resolved, that we, the people of St. Tammany Parish, La., in mass meeting assembled, do hereby heartily endorse the project of building a railroad and automobile bridge across Lake Pontchartrain, from some available point in the city of New Orleans to some desirable point at or near Mandeville; and we call upon the people of St. Tammany and Orleans Parishes to give this great enterprise every material and moral aid possible.

Be it further resolved, that the co-operation of the ladies of St. Tammany and Orleans Parishes is especially requested and we urge upon them an organization or several organizations of their own, to be known as the "Ladies' Auxiliary to the New Orleans and St. Tammany Bridge Association."

Resolved further, that the chairman of this meeting is authorized to appoint a committee on charter and by-laws for this organization, which shall henceforth be known as the "New Orleans and St. Tammany Bridge Association," with instructions to report same to a meeting to be held in the near future, time and place to be designated by the chairman.

Resolved further, that we call upon the people of Washington and Tangipahoa Parishes to consider if their interests do not justify their support and aid for this enterprise; and it is possible by means of said bridge to shorten the distance from Franklinton, Amite City and Hammond to New Orleans by many miles.

Resolved further, that the proposed bridge across Lake Pontchartrain must be either owned by the public, or interests of the general public safeguarded by ample, clear and specific charter provisions so that the said bridge may not be absorbed and controlled wholly by private interests. Said bridge must and shall forever be open to the use of the general public, and any express company or other common carrier, any railroad, passenger or freight, whether using steam or any other motive power, which may be operated by means of said bridge, enter the city of New Orleans, all under equal and non-discriminatory rules and regulations, charges and tolls, to be adopted and concurred in by the police jury of the parish of St. Tammany and the city council of the city of New Orleans.

This matter was threshed out before the State Railroad Commission a few months ago, and the commission ordered the Northeastern Railroad Company to build a new depot this year at the new location selected by the commission. Order was issued in April, and the new depot was to be completed within six months from the time of the order. The representatives of the several interests are ordered to appear before Judge Brandt in Baton Rouge, the thirty-first of the present month. The Slidell Grocery and Grain Company have completed a new warehouse ninety feet long, and is known as No. 5. This concern is exclusively wholesalers of groceries and grain, and does a business of about \$100,000 a month. The Slidell Planning Mill Company have about completed their plant, which will be dressers for the trade of yellow pine lumber. W. T. Tippin has bought an interest in the plant of the Slidell Saw Mill Company, and has put in a dry-
