THE BRIDGE COMMITTEE.

Mr. Geo. G. McHardy, chairman of the bridge committee, has appointed the following committee of five on constitution and by-laws. This committee will also appoint the board of directors, which will have entire charge of the bridge matter: H. C. Ramos, Lloyd Posey, H. C. Riggs, J. E. Gilson and June Poitevent, with H. L. Garland as secretary.

SPEAKS OF BRIDGE.

H. C. Riggs made an address before the Mercantile Club, New Orleans, Thursday, on the Pontchartrain bridge matter. His proposition is to bond the Public Belt Railroad of New Orleans for five million dollars and to use this money for building the bridge. Mr. Riggs made an excellent talk and created a favorable impression as to his proposed plan. He stated that his proposition would be to construct an earthen embankment with a crown about 60 feet and a base full 300 feet, resting upon the bottom of the lake. This embankment would be an average height of 14 feet above the surface of the lake. It would consist of sixteen miles of pipe-retaining walls, the cost of which would be about \$1,230,000; an earth embankment between the retaining walls with a 60-foot crown, a cost \$640,000; four miles of concrete arches, 50 feet wide, for tidal openings, to cost \$400,000, and several draw-bridges, costing in the aggregate \$300,000.
