NEW BANK BUILDING OF COVINGTON BANK AND TRUST COMPANY.

Contract Has Been Awarded to J. D. Collins, of New Orleans.

The building to be completed by February 1, 1912.

Bids were opened last week on the new bank building of the Covington Bank and Trust Company, and the contract was awarded to J. D. Collins, of New Orleans. The bids ranged from \$14,100 to \$21,000. The cost of the new building is considered to be decreased from the fact that the foundation of the old building is perfectly good and will be used in the construction of the new building. Work has already begun in clearing up the debris of the fire and work will be pushed as fast as possible. The building will be a handsome two-story pressed brick front; in fact, it will be a duplicate of the building destroyed by fire.
