## Babe Left on Woman's Doorstep Dies in Hospital as Result of Exposure.

New Orleans, La., Oct. 3, 1911.—Mrs. Maud Pennington, proprietor of the Pennington Hotel, Julia street, near Camp, found on her doorstep at 11 o'clock yesterday morning, wrapped in an old shawl, the almost lifeless body of a baby boy not more than two years old. The child died a few hours later, after being taken to the Charity Hospital. Who its parents are and who deserted it no one has been able to learn.

At the hospital, House Surgeon Dana ordered the infant dispatched to ward No. 61 in the Milken Memorial, where it succumbed shortly after from bronchial pneumonia, evidently brought about by exposure. Mrs. Pennington said last night that this made the third infant found on her doorstep in the last six weeks.

Mrs. Pennington, in speaking about the dying child left on her doorstep yesterday, said it had about its little body only a shawl, and that the shawl was dilapidated, lending the impression that its parents were in destitute circumstances and unable to care for it.—Times Democrat.

## SHOOTING OF MISS MILLER.

Efforts to Quiet the Affair, But Police Make Affidavit.

With several stories varying in connection with the wounding of Miss Miller in her home, on Market street, early Sunday morning, those who have delved into the matter do not see much of a chance to press Charles Miller, the brother, for the wounding of the young woman.

Even now Charles Miller insists that there was no quarrel between him and any member of the family, and that he accidentally dropped his revolver and that the bullet struck his sister, wounding her severely. And he held yesterday that his brother, George, was not present at the moment.

But the young woman after much reflection, said that she was the peacemaker, said when she returned to her home with Mr. McCiure and Miss Walker, after having been to a lawn party, her brother took her to task, thinking she had been to the lake instead of at a lawn party, and started scolding her. It was at this juncture that her brother Charles appeared, and that her brother Charles took George to task about scolding the young woman. There was a bitter quarrel between the brothers about that, and when the men showed up, Miss Miller said that she stepped between the men, and in wrestling for the weapon the bullet was exploded and she was wounded. Now, it was known that George Miller was there at the time, but George says that he was not, and while he tells of the quarrel between his brother and himself, and remarks that his sister had advised him to go away and avoid trouble, he insists that he departed and was on the sidewalk when the shot was fired.

Inspector of police Reynolds had detectives Stubbs and D. Mellen on the case, and they hammered away and obtained information which convinced them that the shot fired was accident it struck the young woman.

Muddled as the case is, with all of the family endeavoring to bring about a peaceful ending of the quarrel because of Miss Miller being out late, there is not much hope for a conviction, though the police made an affidavit in the case against Charles Miller yesterday before the court of Judge Fisher, and the prosecution will be conducted to the end by District Attorney Adams and his force.—Picayune.
