TO THE PUBLIC.

Covington, La., Oct. 1911.
I have been asked to give a public statement of why I resigned as Superintendent of the School Board of St. Tammany parish, La., and I now take this opportunity of doing so.

At our last regular meeting in July, I did not have a sufficient number of teachers to nominate for all of the schools; the board authorized me to go ahead and secure teachers. Many teachers who were appointed at that meeting did not accept, and several of them who did accept, have since resigned. This made it absolutely necessary for me to secure quite a number of teachers. I went ahead in discharge of this duty, and had about eighteen or twenty teachers to nominate at our meeting last Saturday. Most of these teachers are teaching and have been; others have since contracted and have been approved of by the president of the board to begin work later, when their schools will open. One teacher, Mrs. Hester McDougall Wallis, before she was married, was appointed as teacher of the Hickory Grove school. She would not accept this position and asked for another. I promised her an assistant's place in the Folsom Consolidated School, provided she would not marry until the school closed; I stated to her that she school room was not a fit place in which to spend the honeymoon. She assured me that she was not to be married, and insisted upon me giving her the place. I gave her my word that I would do so on the above condition. She immediately married and I notified her that I could not employ her and would immediately proceed to employ or secure someone else to take her place. I did so and have signed up a contract with another teacher, when contract has been approved by the president of the board. At our meeting Saturday, a petition from some of the citizens of Folsom was presented to the board asking for Mrs. Hester McDougall Wallis, appointment as assistant teacher of the Folsom Consolidated School, in

lieu of the one that I had appointed. The board refused to confirm the appointment of the teacher that I had contracted with and assumed the authority of Superintendent, appointing their own teacher, and proceeded to elect her. I stated positively to the board that I would not nominate Mrs. Wallis and if they proceeded to elect her over my protest I would tender my resignation. They unhesitatingly nominated Mrs. Wallis. I then tendered my resignation and propose to deliver up the keys to-day. I am now ready to do so, but for the sake of the teachers and the schools, I will remain in my office a few days longer, and give the board a chance to secure some one else to take charge of the office. The above are my reasons for acting as I have. I regret very much having to take these steps, but my manhood compels me to do so. It is my first experience to have a man come before the school board with a petition asking and begging for employment for his wife in the school, and the action of the school board has given room for an innumerable number of petitions to be presented to them at any and all meetings, making a similar request. They have set the precedent that any community or citizen may appeal to the school board to have Cousin Bob or his wife or his daughter, or Cousin Sally or her friends or someone else to be appointed a teacher in one of the schools, and not upon the actual merits of the applicant. If the school board is satisfied in its action I am. The teacher in question under the law is not entitled to any salary, but I do not care to be mixed up in any wrangle, so I leave it to the board.
