

### FRANCHISE FOR NEW RAILROAD.

Mr. W. Tracy, of Cleveland, Ohio, has outlined an electric railroad to run from Slidell to Houllonville, and had a petition before the police jury of this parish last Monday asking for a franchise. The petition being complete, was referred back to Mr. Tracy and will no doubt be taken up at their next meeting on Monday, November 20. This will be quite an addition to this parish and no doubt the franchise will be granted if properly presented.

NEW GAME PRESERVE.

By expending the ridiculously small sum of \$1 a year the State of Louisiana will add another duck breeding ground to her present list, which now numbers four, and a large tract of ground near Chef Menteur, which was leased by the Board of Commissioners for the Protection of Birds, Game and Fish, on Tuesday, will be fenced in and ducks brought from other parts to inhabit it.

The land was secured from the Louisville and Nashville, Superintendant, Charles Marshall, being most active in assisting the Game Commission to secure the ground. The area embraced is several acres located about a mile and a half east of Chef Menteur.

The particular feature about the tract which caught the quick eye of Frank M. Miller, president of the Game Commission, was that on the grounds are located seven ponds, the smallest being over sixty feet in length and breadth. Mr. Miller at once mapped out a plan by which the Commission could utilize the tract to its best advantage. He determined to secure for the hunters in this part of the State black mallard ducks at present an unknown quantity. The black mallard abounds near the mouth of the Mississippi river and in Vermillion and Cameron parishes, but never frequent the New Orleans vicinity.

Mr. Miller intends to build a fence about the newly-acquired property near the gulf, and to populate that section with black mallards. He has made an agreement with the hunters who will sell all the wounded mallards to him. The fact that the ducks will be wounded will not detract from their breeding qualities, and many will recover entirely.

Mr. Miller was very optimistic as to the outcome of the scheme. He said that the commission had ordered fox tail grass seed, wild potatoes and a grass of the sage family to be planted in and about the ponds, and that in a short time the conditions

for duck breeding will be ideal.

Chief Clerk Thomas Campbell, of the Game Commission, has made arrangements with the care taker of the Metairie Cemetery by which the commission can have all of the acorns that fall from the trees. It is well established fact that there is no better fodder for ducks, and Mr. Miller proposes to gather all the acorns obtainable and throw them into the ponds for the ducks to feed upon. The ducks in Cameron parish feed on acorns, and it is said that they excel in flavor.

ASWELL CLUB ORGANIZED.

An Aswell Club for the parish of St. Tammany was organized here last Wednesday night with the assistance of twenty-two citizens of this parish, Mandeville and Abita Springs being well attended, one or two from Slidell and one from Covington.

The following officers were elected: President—V. B. Cooper, of Covington.

Vice-President—H. Jack, of Slidell.

Secretary—Jas Clarain, of Abita Springs.

Treasurer—L. A. Perrand, of Covington.

In order to further the candidacy of Dr. Aswell in this parish, the following committee was appointed: Robert Abney, Alexander Rogers, Pascal Favron, Eugene Moren, C. T. Schmalz, H. H. Levy, H. Jack, R. W. House, Frank Martin, Wallace Davis, Emile Burkenstock, John Lemon, Archie Cook, Chas. Hurst and C. C. Cooley.

The following resolutions were adopted: Resolved That we realize that Dr. Aswell is the only candidate in the race for governor whose candidacy appeals directly to the people. The other two candidates were endorsed and nominated by certain cliques or rings for corporate interests and control of local patronage. If either should be elected governor, he will be under obligations to the clique or corporate influence that elected him. On the contrary, if Dr. James B. Aswell is elected governor he will be obligated only to the free and independent Democrats of this State. He will owe nothing to any one individual or to any corporate interest.

Be it further resolved, That this meeting of the Democrats of St. Tammany parish en masse assembled do pledge our earnest support and our vote to James B. Aswell in his race for governor of the State of Louisiana.
