FIREMAN RESCUES WOMAN ON BURNING CANAL STREET BUILDING.

Thousands of people saw a fire picture last night on Canal street, near Rampart, which will never be forgotten, and for a time they shuddered, many closing their eyes to shut off the sight of Ella Garry, terror stricken on the ledge of the roof of the fourteen story building which was burning, ready to make the mad leap into the street.

It was more thrilling than anything seen in years. Under their breath men and women begged that luck be with the firemen who were working for the rescue. There were shouts from the fire fighters for the negro to stay where she was.

The mürmer went the rounds that a fireman had the woman. The eyes of those who did not want to see a tragedy opened, and when Magee lifted the woman to his shoulder and began descending the rungs there was a wide burst of applause, which will always live in the memory of the hero. Magee went slowly down the ladder until he reached the street, where policemen circled the rescued woman and the rescuer, and in a moment or so Captain Leroy and Sergeant Dunn whisked Ella, still trembling, away towards police headquarters, where questions concerning the fire. Magee remained at work.

That Ella Garry was caught in a trap was certain. It seems that she had finished her work in the home of Mrs. Hilda Lawrence, who occupies the third and fourth floor of the building, 1010 Canal, as a residence and hair dressing establishment. Just about 8 o'clock the servant was ready to go, and she stopped on the stair case to talk to her mistress. It was while they were there that Mrs. Lawrence heard a sharp crack which fire makes, and she asked the servant to go with her to see if there was anything wrong. The servant was flustered and hurried up to the kitchen and it was there that the fire, which was evidently caused by a leaking gas stove, was raging. The negro got into the smoke and staggered around, and when she tried to make her way out she perceived that she was cut off. The stairway was burning. There was but one place for her to go to escape, and Ella took the chance to climb out of the attic window which she reached by a small stair. Scrambling to the roof the woman rubbed her eyes and coughed the smoke from her throat and felt her way over to the ledge, which shows on Canal street. Suddenly her figure loomed to its fullest height. Her arms waivered frantically. She was seen from the street. The firemen were sharp eyed and swift. The ladder rose without delay, and Magee was ascending as fast as his hands and feet would let him. He affected the rescue just at the moment when the woman was going to jump to death.

The flames burned fiercely and Mrs. Lawrence's furniture was damaged about \$500. The second floor, which was used as a restaurant by Charles Fung, suffered a severe damage by water. The first floor, which was occupied by Mehlig & Rose, jewelers, and Rufus Apple, a photographer, was not damaged. The building, which is owned by Santos Oteri, was damaged about \$2500.

The police spent some little while investigating the affair and finally concluded that a leak in the gas stove caused the flames. Pizzuone, October 27th.
