The following ordinance levying a 7/8 mills for general revenue purpose and a 4 mills tax, for the public school house, upon all the taxable property within the town of Covington, was introduced by Leon Hebert, and the same was read in full, as follows:

ORDINANCE NO. 9. An ordinance to provide revenue for the town of Covington for the year 1912, for the purpose of paying the statutory, usual, necessary and ordinary charges of said town for the said year 1912.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the mayor and town council of the town of Covington, That 7/8 mills on the dollar is hereby levied on all the taxable property, taxable under the laws of the State of Louisiana, situated within the corporate limits of the town of Covington, according to the assessed value of said property as shown on the assessment roll of the town of Covington for the year 1911 which assessment is now on file in the office of the secretary of the town council, for the purpose of raising and providing sufficient revenue to meet the statutory, usual, necessary and ordinary charges and obligations of the said town of Covington, for the year 1912, as shown by the budget for the year 1912, adopted by the said town council.

Section 2. Be it further ordained, etc., That in addition to the levy of the millage specified above, an additional 4 mill tax on the dollar is hereby levied for the year 1911, on all taxable property, taxable under the laws of the State of Louisiana, situated in the town of Covington, according to the assessed value of said property as shown by the assessment roll for the year 1911, as a special tax incurred by the taxpayers at a special election held for the purpose of erecting a public school building in the town of Covington, and that said special tax of 4 mills is collected the same be turned over to the School Treasurer for the purpose of paying the interest and principal of the bonds authorized at said special election.

Section 3. Be it further ordained etc., That the tax collector be and he is hereby authorized and instructed to proceed with the collection of the taxes for the year 1911, according to the assessment roll for 1911, and the provisions and instructions herein.

regular meeting of the said council, held on the 21st day of November A. D. 1911, levied a tax of seven and one-half mills on the dollar on all taxable property situated in the town of Covington, for general revenue purposes for the year 1911, as shown by the assessment roll of the said town of Covington for the said year 1911, made and submitted by the Parish Assessor for the parish of St. Tammany, State of Louisiana, which roll was duly received, accepted and approved by the town council, and which roll is now on file in the office of the secretary of the said town council of the town of Covington.

And whereas, the levy of said seven and one-half mills is sufficient to meet all of the statutory, necessary, usual and ordinary charges to be paid by the town council according to the budget for the year 1911, adopted by the said town council of the town of Covington, and the various resolutions carrying into effect the various appropriations therein provided in said budget.

And whereas, the said Mayor and Town Council of the town of Covington, desire to appropriate the sum of ten thousand dollars for the purpose of erecting and constructing a public school house within the corporate limits of the town of Covington, and said bonds to be funded into bonds, and said bonds to run for a period of ten years, beginning with the year 1911, and to dedicate the avails of the residue of the ten mills that the said Mayor and Town Council is permitted to levy, for the said period of ten years.

And whereas, there still remains after the levy of the said seven and one-half mills on the dollar upon all taxable property within the corporate limits of the said town of Covington, for general revenue purposes, two and one-half mills of the ten mill tax authorized by Article 232 of the Constitution of the State of Louisiana, adopted May 12, 1898, and which said town through its town council is authorized to levy and impose annually for revenue purposes.

Therefore be it resolved by the Mayor and Town Council of the town of Covington, Louisiana, That the avails of the residue of the ten mill tax, authorized by the Constitution and laws of the State of Louisiana, or so much thereof as may be necessary to make the sum of \$10,000, and the additional amount or sum necessary to pay the interest thereon said amount be and the same is hereby dedicated and set aside for a period of ten years beginning with the year 1911 and ending with the year 1921, which amount of ten thousand dollars so dedicated and set aside out of the avails of the residue of said ten mill tax for the years hereinafter specified and fixed, is for the purpose of erecting and constructing a public school house within the corporate limits of the town of Covington. And the said bonds herein shall not be sold for less than par.

Be it further resolved etc., That the bond issue herein provided for, shall be divided into and represented by twenty bonds, numbered from No. 1 to No. 20, both inclusive, and the amount or denomination of each of said bonds shall be for the sum of five hundred dollars. That two of said bonds, beginning with the lowest serial numbers thereof, shall mature and become due and payable the 1st day of December 1912, and that on the same date of each year thereafter, two of said bonds shall mature, and become due and payable, according to their serial number, and so on for each of the said ten years said bonds are to run until the entire series of said bonds shall have matured.

Be it further resolved, etc., That two mills, or so much thereof only that may be necessary, of the residue of the said ten mill tax the town of Covington is authorized to impose, is hereby levied upon all taxable property situated in the town of Covington, for the years 1911, 1912, 1913, 1914, 1915, 1916, 1917, 1918, 1919, 1920 and 1921, and that the avails, amounts, or sum derived from the levy of said two mills of this two mills, or so much thereof as may be deemed necessary, to be levied for each of the said years herein above specified and fixed, is hereby dedicated and set aside for the sole purpose of paying the interest on the said bonds as they mature, and shall not be used for any other purpose. And the tax collector of the town of Covington is hereby empowered, authorized and ordered to collect in addition, to the seven and one-half mills levied for general purposes of providing revenues, and the four mills special tax for school purposes the two mills on all taxable property situated within the corporate limits of the town of Covington, for the years herein fixed, beginning with the year 1911.

Be it further resolved, etc., That the amount or funds derived from the sale of the bonds herein provided for, shall not be used for any other purpose than to erect and construct a public school house within the corporate limits of the town of Covington. And the said bonds herein shall not be sold for less than par.
