**THE LOADED GUN AGAIN.**

One Negro Killed and Another is Wounded by Playing With a Gun.

Sunday evening the sharp report of a pistol in the negro quarters of Covington, on Madison street, startled those in the neighborhood and a negro was seen to stagger on the sidewalk and clasp his hand to his head. It was found that a bullet had entered his left breast and lodged on his cheek-bone. His wound was dressed by Dr. Pigott. Investigation disclosed that Lucinda Elliott, a negro woman living in a nearby house, had been handling a revolver while in bed and that it had exploded. The ball entering her breast and passing through her heart, came out at the spine, made its way through the door and into the cheek of Thomas Fuller a negro employed by T. C. Adams at the turpentine still. The woman's brother claims to have witnessed the accident, having just opened the bedroom door when it occurred.



**SALMEN COMPANY WINS.**

Judge King Friday decided the suit of the Salmen Brick and Lumber Company vs. Southern Pacific Company giving judgment for the plaintiff for \$3,578.62, with interest and costs as prayed for.

The action was brought to recover \$4,101.72, the value of a barge lost of crossed pine poles and lumber, alleged to have been sunk by swells of the steamer Creole.

The defense was that the barge was overloaded and left without a watchman.
