THE PRESS IN POLITICS.

The value of the primary in expressing the will of the people depends upon the active interest of the people themselves. Each succeeding election is teaching them that individual inactivity and indifference are responsible for conditions that can be removed by shouldering the responsibilities of citizenship. The larger number of voters are always out of any aggregation that may expect to gain immediate profit, by side of any aggregation, through the election of particular candidates; hence it is within the power of the people, at a final primary to elect the candidate who merits their support. All that a primary to elect citizens are interested in is placing in office competent and conscientious citizens who will honestly fulfill their duties, but unfortunately many citizens do not exercise their right to vote until conditions become so unendurable that they are forced to the ballot box to seek relief. When this occurs, victory is always with the right. It is through the press of the State that the voters glean the knowledge of bettering conditions, and it is through the press that a majority learn of the fitness of each candidate for the office aspired to.

Personal abuse is to be deplored, but the voters have a right to know the character and ability of the candidate who is asking for their votes, and the press of the State is performing a duty when it places this information within the reach of all. Persecution is prevented by both criminal and civil procedure and by the sense of justice that would cause the people to repudiate any such attempt. The power of the press when it has right on its side, is the greatest that can be used in a political campaign, and the weakest when it is perverted to personal interests; and the people may be depended upon to read between the lines and separate the truth from superlative discrimination, pocket-book reinforcement or antediluvian attachments. The effect of the disclosures by the New Orleans papers of the land deals made by Mr. Michel has so changed the political complexion of St. Tammany parish that it is freckled with opposition where it was once rosy with pleasure when his name was mentioned. There is a feeling among the people that the head executive of the State should have those attributes that will place its interests above the acquisition of personal profits and that will secure to citizens a just recognition of their rights.

When Mr. Aswell spoke in Covington he said that he had been told this was the eighteenth ward. He was misinformed. There is to-day probably no parish freer from the domination of any particular faction than the parish of St. Tammany. Governor Sanders, who had the united strength of all the political leaders at the last election, could not marshal one-third of them to-day and Broussard will beat him badly. Michel, who was certain of a majority a few months ago, has been so badly hurt by the land deals that it does not seem possible that he can win. All this shows that the people are learning to think for themselves, to read and to investigate and to act for their best interests.

We think the highest vote in this parish will be cast for the candidate whose record and ability stands out the clearest and best at the time of election, and whom the people believe will be able to subserve the best interests of the State.

them at pleasure, and may make and establish, as well as alter or amend any and all by-laws, rules and regulations for the conduct, support and management of the business and affairs of the corporation. Said board of directors shall have full power to contract debts, borrow money, issue notes, bills of exchange, bonds and other obligations, and execute and grant mortgages, and to receive same, and generally to do all things necessary for the conduct of the business. And shall have full power to issue and deliver full paid shares of stock for cash or property received, services performed or labor done. All certificates of stock of this corporation after duly having been ordered issued by the board of directors, shall bear the seal of this corporation and be signed by the president and the secretary. In the absence of the president, then signed by the vice-president.

ARTICLE VII.
This charter of incorporation may be changed, modified or amended, or this corporation may be dissolved at a general meeting of the stockholders convened for that purpose with the assent of three-fourths of the entire stock present or represented at the said meeting. Thirty days prior notice of such meeting being given in a weekly newspaper published at Covington, St. Tammany parish, Louisiana, and a written notice thereof mailed to each stockholder at his usual place of business forty days prior to said meeting. In case of the dissolution or termination of this corporation by limitation as herein fixed, or otherwise, the affairs of this corporation shall be liquidated by two commissioners elected from among the stockholders at a meeting called for that purpose, due notice having been given as hereinbefore stated. Said commissioners shall remain in office until the affairs of this corporation shall have been fully liquidated.

ARTICLE VIII.
The duties of this corporation shall be to receive, store, transport, convey, store, warehouse, sell or otherwise use or dispose of same; to drill, bore or put down, excavate or make, and maintain, repair, operate, and work any wells, shafts, mines or other works that may be necessary or convenient to accomplish and carry on the objects and purposes herein set forth; to build, erect, repair, maintain and operate any buildings, houses, pumps, machinery, apparatus, wharves, canals, levees, reservoirs, pipe lines, tanks or other things that may be necessary or expedient to accomplish and carry on the objects and purposes herein set forth, and in general to do and act anything necessary, convenient or incidental to the accomplishment of said objects and purposes.

ARTICLE IX.
The capital stock of this corporation is hereby fixed at the sum of thirty-five thousand dollars, to be divided into shares of ten dollars each. Said stock shall be paid for in cash, or its equivalent in real property, or personal property, or labor performed in such manner and under the terms as may be determined by the board of directors, but no certificates of stock shall be issued until the same has been paid for either in cash or property received, services rendered or labor performed. No transfer of stock shall be binding upon this corporation unless recorded upon its books, and until the certificate of stock shall have been delivered to the corporation and duly cancelled.

ARTICLE X.
All the corporate powers of this corporation shall be vested in a board of directors, composed of eleven stockholders, of whom five shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business; the number of said board of directors may be increased or decreased by the board of directors, but in that case, a majority of the number of the board of directors shall constitute a quorum thereof. Said board of directors shall be elected on the second Monday of the month of December of each year and shall immediately after the election elect from among their number a president, vice-president and a treasurer, each of whom shall be a stockholder. They shall also elect a secretary who may or may not be a stockholder. Each stockholder shall be entitled to one vote for every share of stock owned by him or her. All elections shall be by ballot and held at the office of the said corporation, under the superintendence of two commissioners to be appointed for that purpose by the board of directors. The majority of the votes cast shall elect said board of directors who with the officers thereof shall continue in office until their successors have been elected and qualified. Notice of the election of a board of directors shall be given by publication in some newspaper published at the domicile of the corporation for a period of at least ten days previous to said election. The first election of the board of directors under this charter shall take place on the second Monday in December, 1912, and thereafter, or until their successors have been duly elected and qualified, the following persons shall constitute the first board of directors, namely: B. B. Warren, A. H. Grimmer, E. B. Stern, P. J. Lacroix, L. Cole, E. G. Del Corral, A. R. Smith, Thomas Lacroix, S. D. Bullock, K. V. Richard and M. P. Planche, of whom B. B. Warren is president; E. B. Stern, vice-president; A. H. Grimmer, secretary, and P. J. Lacroix, treasurer. The failure from any cause to elect directors on the day stipulated shall not dissolve this corporation, but the officers and directors then in office shall hold over until their successors have been elected and qualified. In the event of failure to hold the election on the day stipulated the president shall call a new election immediately as hereinabove provided. Any director shall have the right to vote on all questions before the board, either in person or by proxy, the person holding same to be counted in place of the absent member. The board of directors shall have the power to fill any vacancies occurring in its membership from among the stockholders of the corporation. They shall have full control of the property of this corporation and shall conduct and manage its business. They shall appoint such officers, agents and clerks as may be necessary for the conducting of the business affairs of the corporation, and shall fix their compensation and shall have the right to dismiss

all the stockholders were present, notice of said meeting and of the stockholders having been given as required by law, which resolution is as follows:

Resolved, That Article 2 of the Charter of this corporation executed before Herman E. Gayer, Notary Public, dated October 21, 1908, be amended so as to read as follows:

Article 2. The domicile of this corporation shall be at Tallapoosa, St. Tammany parish, Louisiana, where all citations, papers and other legal documents shall be served upon the president, or in his absence the vice-president, or in his absence the secretary.

Be it further resolved, That Article 7 of said charter be amended so as to read:

Article 7. This charter may be changed, modified or amended and the capital stock of this corporation increased or decreased, or this corporation may be dissolved at a general meeting of the stockholders convened for that purpose with the assent of three-fourths of the entire stock present or represented at the said meeting. Thirty days prior notice of such meeting being given in a weekly newspaper published at Covington, St. Tammany parish, Louisiana, and a written notice thereof mailed to each stockholder at his usual place of business forty days prior to said meeting. In case of the dissolution or termination of this corporation by limitation as herein fixed, or otherwise, the affairs of this corporation shall be liquidated by two commissioners elected from among the stockholders at a meeting called for that purpose, due notice having been given as hereinbefore stated. Said commissioners shall remain in office until the affairs of this corporation shall have been fully liquidated.

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
