HAMMOND. Cold Snap Proves Good for Strawberry Growers.

Hammond, La., Feb. 7.—Burglars entered the Brooks Hardware Company's store some time last night, and made a successful raid in the firearms and cutlery department.

The strawberry men in this section are rejoicing over the present cold snap. The berries had begun to bloom, and with a few more days of warm weather, would have been susceptible to a late frost.

The present cold weather is holding them well in check, and the indications are that the truckmen will not be handicapped as they were last spring.

On every crate of berries that leaves this place, will be placed a label bearing the inscription, "Grown in Tangipahoa parish." The labels will be furnished this year, by the Progressive Union, an advertisement distributed throughout the parish.

A number of residents have been notified by the Board of Health of violations of the sanitary code. The new sanitary ordinance will go into effect on April 1, and at a meeting of the board last night, an advertisement was placed for bids to carry out the necessary work.

A form of cesspool was adopted as the standard for Hammond, and blue prints were ordered furnished all requiring same. The regular meeting of the city council was held Tuesday night, all members being present except Clerk James E. Adams, who was detained in New Orleans. E. Richardson acted as clerk. Quite a large number of ladies were present at the meeting.

Voters Totalling 800 Ask Election on Whiskey Question. Franklinton La., Feb. 8.—A petition was presented to the police jury to-day asking that body to order an election on the whiskey question.

About 800 signatures were on the petition. Action was deferred until the next meeting, which will be March 4. Washington parish voted in favor of prohibition in the seventies and since then no election has been held on the question. The police jury is in favor of prohibition, and it is very likely that no election will be ordered.

UNDER ARREST. Mayor of Baton Rouge Was Assisted in Marking Ballot. Baton Rouge, Feb. 8.—Warrants were yesterday served on the thirteen alleged violators of the election laws who on Jan. 23 asked for and received "assistance" in marking their ballots. The number included Mayor Roux and other persons prominent among the "regular" faction in the parish. Judge Brunot has issued a call for a special session of the grand jury to investigate all cases of alleged election law violations, of which there are alleged to have been a large number in this country.

The district attorney has signified his intention of taking this means to get at all the violators, whether of the good government or regular factions. The informations against the regulars were made by the Hall club, a separate organization from the Good Government League, and the latter has no connection with the prosecutions.

SLIDELL COUNCIL. Slidell, La., January 2, 1912. Ordinance No. 121 was put before the council and read. ORDINANCE NO. 121. An ordinance levying an annual tax upon all trade, corporations or persons pursuing any trade, calling, occupation or profession not exempt by law, within the corporate limits of the town of Slidell, La., during the year 1912.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the town of Slidell, La., in legal session convened, that a license tax is hereby levied for the year 1912 upon all persons, corporations, or associations of persons pursuing any trade, calling, occupation, or profession, or business not exempt by law, within the corporate limits of the town of Slidell, which is subjected to State license.

Section 2. Be it further ordained by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the town of Slidell, Louisiana, in legal session convened, that the amount of license tax shall be for the same as is hereby levied and collectable by the State for the same kind of trade, business, occupation, profession or calling, excepting the license tax for the sale at retail of spirituous or intoxicating liquors, for which license tax shall be as hereinafter fixed.

Section 3. Be it further ordained by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the town of Slidell, La., in legal session convened, that the license tax for carrying on the business of saloon, liquor exchange, or the retailing of liquors in less quantities than five gallons is hereby fixed at the minimum sum of Five Hundred (\$500) Dollars and graded in accordance with the amount of business done the preceding year as designated by law; that the license tax for carrying on the business of selling at retail beer or wine only is hereby fixed at the minimum sum of Two Hundred and Fifty (\$250) Dollars.

Section 4. Be it further ordained by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the town of Slidell, La., in legal session convened, that no license shall be issued for a longer period than one year and the license taxes as herein levied and due said town of Slidell shall be due and collectable on the same day and date as the license tax is due the State and if not paid at the said time the same shall be delinquent and collectable under the same penalties as those imposed by the State.

Section 5. It shall be the duty of the tax collector to notify all license payers when the said tax is due by them and when the same shall become delinquent and he shall report all delinquents to the town attorney who is hereby empowered to institute suit for collection and the said delinquent license tax payer shall be subject to all costs, charges and interest as is fixed by the State laws for delinquent license tax payers.

Adopted at this, a regular meeting held on January 2, 1912. PAUL GARBERE, Mayor. JOHN FREDERICK, Secretary.

Ordinance No. 121 was carried by a majority vote of the council. Motion by Mr. Liddle, seconded by Mr. Dubuisson, that ordinance No. 121 be adopted as read.
