Slidell, La., January 2, 1912.
Ordinance No. 121, 1912, be adopted by the council and read.
ORDINANCE NO. 121.
An ordinance levying an annual tax upon all trade, corporations or persons pursuing any trade, calling, occupation or profession not exempt by law, within the corporate limits of the town of Slidell, La., during the year 1912.
Section 1. Be it ordained by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the town of Slidell, Louisiana, in legal session convened, That a license tax is hereby levied for the year 1912 upon all persons, corporations, or associations of persons pursuing any trade, calling, occupation, of profession, or business not exempt by law, within the town of Slidell, which is subject to State license.
Section 2. Be it further ordained by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the town of Slidell, Louisiana, in legal session convened, That the amount of license tax shall be and the same is hereby fixed at the same amount as is hereby levied and collected for the year 1911.
Section 3. Be it further ordained by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the town of Slidell, Louisiana, in legal session convened, That no license shall be issued for a longer period than one year and the license taxes as herein levied and due the said town of Slidell shall be due and collectable on the same day and date as the license tax is due the State and it not paid at the said time the same shall be delinquent and collectable under the same penalties as those imposed by the State.
Section 4. Be it further ordained by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the town of Slidell, Louisiana, in legal session convened, That in addition to the levying of the millage specified above, an additional five mill tax on the dollar is hereby levied for the year 1912 on all taxable property taxable under the laws of the State of Louisiana which is situated within the corporate limits of the town of Slidell according to the assessed valuation of said property, as shown on the assessment roll of the town of Slidell, La., for the year 1911, which assessment is now on file in the office of the Secretary of the town council, for the purpose of raising and providing sufficient revenues to meet the statutory, usual, necessary, special and ordinary charges of the town of Slidell for the year 1912 as shown by the budget for the year 1912 adopted by the said mayor and board of aldermen.
Section 5. Be it further ordained by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the town of Slidell, Louisiana, in legal session convened, That in addition to the levying of the millage specified above, an additional five mill tax on the dollar is hereby levied for the year 1912 on all taxable property taxable under the laws of the State of Louisiana which is situated within the corporate limits of the town of Slidell according to the assessed valuation of said property, as shown on the assessment roll of the town of Slidell, La., for the year 1911, which assessment is now on file in the office of the Secretary of the town council, for the purpose of raising and providing sufficient revenues to meet the statutory, usual, necessary, special and ordinary charges of the town of Slidell for the year 1912 as shown by the budget for the year 1912 adopted by the said mayor and board of aldermen.
Section 6. Be it further ordained by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the town of Slidell, Louisiana, in legal session convened, That no license shall be issued for a longer period than one year and the license taxes as herein levied and due the said town of Slidell shall be due and collectable on the same day and date as the license tax is due the State and it not paid at the said time the same shall be delinquent and collectable under the same penalties as those imposed by the State.
Section 7. It shall be the duty of the tax collector to notify all license payers when the said tax is due by them and when the same shall become delinquent and he shall report all delinquents to the town attorney who is hereby empowered to institute suit for collection and the said delinquent license tax payer shall be subject to all costs, charges and interest as is fixed by the laws of this State for delinquent license tax payers.

ORDINANCE NO. 122.
An ordinance levying a tax of two dollars on all male inhabitants of the town of Slidell, La., between the ages of 18 and 55 years, for the purpose of working and improving the streets and bridges.
Section 1. Be it ordained by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the town of Slidell, La., in legal session convened, That there is hereby levied upon all male inhabitants of the town of Slidell, between the ages of eighteen and fifty-five years, a per capita tax of two dollars for the year 1912 for the purpose of working and improving the roads, streets, and bridges of the said town of Slidell, Louisiana.
Section 2. That the said per capita tax shall be due and collectable within ten days after notice given and that any person refusing to pay said tax, or working three days on the streets of said town, shall be subject to the same penalties as imposed by the State law in neglecting to pay road tax.
Adopted at this, a regular meeting held on January 2, 1912.

Resolution No. 2 was offered by finance committee for adoption: Be it resolved by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the town of Slidell, that the sum of \$1800 be and is hereby especially appropriated out of the town revenues for the year 1912, or so much thereof as is necessary for the purpose of paying salaries of all the officers and employees for the said year 1912 as fixed by resolutions upon said subject matter previously or hereafter adopted.
