State Superintendent Harris has recommended to the State Board of Education that every high school teacher shall have an educational qualification equivalent to at least two years of standard college work.

ful unions, thus openly defying the law of God given on Mount Sinai, "Thou shalt not commit adultery."

4. Catholic Federation—Be it resolved, That this Federation of Catholic Women will work in harmony with the Federation of Men, leaving to them the work that is peculiar to men only, viz: Questions of public morality and decency, and all matters that concern the legislative and administrative bodies of the State, the social and the labor questions. We on the other hand will take up the work peculiar to women only, viz: Work of mercy and charity, the lines of the St. Vincent De Paul Society, social work among the women such as establishing of girls homes, protection of traveling girls and women, saving the wayward and fallen girls and assisting the Rev. Pastors in their work for the purety of the christian family and charity, and such other work as may be assigned to us by the executive board of the Federation of Catholic Men, all of which is provided for in our constitution.

Resolutions.

1. Loyalty to the Holy Catholic Church—The Federation of Catholic Societies of Women of St. Tammany Parish in convention assembled for the first time, declares its allegiance to our Holy Father, Pope Pius X, who so graciously received in audience the delegates of the first Federation of Catholic Women of Italy on Jan. 8th, inst., encouraging them in the good work they just had undertaken. We express our loyalty to our Most Rev. Archbishop, who so strongly has advocated the Federation of Catholic Societies, and to the Reverend Pastors, under whose guidance we are about to form this union of Catholic women of this parish.

We assure them of all the moral and financial support to which they are entitled on our part and do hereby promise to remain faithful and loyal daughters of the Holy Mother church.

2. Catholic Education—In union with the Federation of the Catholic Societies we stand for the right of the Catholic child to a Catholic education and we urge all Catholic mothers to make use of the facilities we have in the line of parish schools, where, under the guidance of our devoted clergy and with the co-operation of our religious communities of sisters, our children receive, not only the best of secular education but at the same time that moral and religious training which is absolutely necessary for them in order to become good christians and loyal citizens.

We pledge to our Catholic schools, not only our moral but also our financial support and it will be the aim of this Federation of Catholic women to assist our Rev. Pastors in procuring a christian education for the Catholic children of this parish.

3. Divorce—As Catholic women we repudiate and denounce absolute divorce and we rejoice that the position of Catholics in favor of the sanctity of marriage and against the evils of divorce, has at last commanded the attention of the American people. We earnestly hope that laws will be framed to check instead of promoting divorce, and in the meantime we urge all Catholic women to deny all social intercourse and friendship to persons who have obtained a divorce are living in sin.

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Painting of Noted Historian to be Hung in Historic Cabildo.

The Louisiana Historical Society, through Prof. Alice Fortier, formally received the picture of the late Prof. J. Hanno Deiler, Wednesday evening. The portrait was presented by the National German-American Alliance through Mr. Gus Corlidge. The picture will hang among the most treasured paintings of the historical society in the Cabildo.

Prof. Deiler during his life occupied a prominent part in the affairs of this city and State. Among other things it is due to the efforts of Prof. Deiler that the twenty-sixth national Saengerfest of the North American Singers' union was held in New Orleans in 1890. He also contributed many valuable articles and several historical works relating to the Germans in this country and particularly in Louisiana.

In receiving the portrait Prof. Fortier paid a high tribute to the memory of Prof. Deiler and recalled many personal reminiscences during the years when both taught at Tulane university.

As an appropriate conclusion to the presentation the New Orleans Quartette club, of which Prof. Deiler was a member, rendered a number of vocal selections. Those who contributed to this section of the program were: C. A. Zimmerman, F. Heilig, Julius Koch, C. S. Schaefer, Gustave Keits, Joseph Engel, leader; Emile-Pier, Charles J. Babst, Ferdinand Koelle, L. Hesse, and Wilhelm Graub.

Col. George Soule, a former king of the carnival, also contributed to the evening program with an explanatory address on the carnival. A short business session of the historical society concluded the work of the evening.
