### COVINGTON SCHOOL LEAGUE.

The School Improvement League met Monday, March 4th, entertaining delegates from Mandeville, Folsom and Military Road schools. Supt. Lyon and many of its former members that have been inactive and have returned to the fold, making a large attendance and successful meeting.

Dainty refreshments were served after adjournment, giving an added joy to the pleasant memories of this new acquaintance of our near neighbor leagues. Invitations were also issued to Slidell, Abita Springs and Audubon. We wanted all to hear the report of the State Convention, by our delegate, Mrs. Moses, also to hear a letter which was read by the president from Miss Morris, State organizer, urging each parish to organize a league, thus giving a mouthpiece to all smaller leagues and keeping up interest in all. The ladies have taken it under advisement and the secretary will mail pamphlets to each league, acquainting them with the by-laws, and at a later date hope to have another grand reunion of the St. Tammany Parish League, from this center we hope to radiate into all schools, large and small, and let them know the pleasure of having a league to work for them.

The report of the convention met with warm applause. Covington was much complimented—her report being among the finest. Mrs. Moses brought back the same honor as did Mrs. Burns last year—office of third vice president.

Prof. Anglin gave an interesting short talk touching upon the school finances and the evident struggle to keep them open the months.

Mr. Lyon also took up the subject. This, with many other interesting topics, he handled with usual thoroughness. He heartily endorsed a parish league, in fact, he hopes to see a league in every school of St. Tammany parish. He pointed out to the visitors the many necessities of a school room, placed by our league in the one room we occupied, and we felt proud of ourselves. He doesn't approve of the ladies raising money to keep open schools. That is man's work. He hopes to encourage school premises organizations with gardens, etc., and advises that our school floors be treated with a new preparation that keeps down dust, hence diseases. One treatment a year suffices. Covington's school will receive this attention next summer.

## DEMONSTRATION TRAIN ARRIVES

bred stock. This tick could be overcome and eradicated by the use of the dipping vat, a model of which he exhibited showing how it was used and explaining its effectiveness in tick eradication. He said that in Mississippi they were in general use and that in one county the police jury had put one in every ward for public use. By their use cattle can be freed from the tick in one season. That in Mississippi 150,000 square miles had been cleaned of them in three years.

The native razorback was exhibited in comparison with the Poland China, the Berkshire and the Red Duroc Jersey hogs, and the amusement of the crowd was increased by a humorous story of the Louisiana breed.

Dr. Dalrymple made a statement that is worthy of consideration when he said that the cattle tick is costing the Southern States \$100,000,000 per annum and Louisiana \$5,000,000. When it is considered that this money can be saved by eradicating the tick, and that this can be done by the use of the dipping vat, and that further, Northern cattlemen would invest in Southern lands if we do away with this tick, the question becomes a most important one.

Dr. Richardson spoke with great enthusiasm of the boys corn clubs. He said that they had been one of the greatest means of advertising Louisiana. He wanted the people to go through the car and examine the exhibits of corn grown by them.

That the car had carried these exhibitions over 2500 miles of country and exhibited them in Chicago to admiring crowds. He said that the boys' hog clubs had bred some prize-winning stock, and he also spoke of the work of the girls' clubs.

State Supt. Bynum said of the necessity of education in bringing the best faculties of the State into the work of advancement. He said that the chief asset of the State was not the fine cattle and hogs and corn, but the young people who were growing up and who would be its future mainstay. What was needed was good schools in the country—an education that would give efficiency.

Many listened to the talks from the car and examined the stock and machinery, while others roamed through the coaches with the corn and other exhibits or took advantage of the instructions on canning.

The school children and teachers were among those who listened to the talks made.
