Franklinton, March 28.—District court is in session this week, and is engaged in the trial of jury cases. Doby Tyler, a negro, was convicted yesterday of petit larceny. Henry V. Landrum, white, to-day was convicted of bigamy. Landrum admitted his guilt, but set up in his defense the fact that he was forced into his second marriage by the father and relatives of the girl he married. Landrum was convicted on this same case last year, but was granted a new trial by the Supreme Court.

Men Acquitted of Arson, Woman Witness Accused of Perjury.
Franklinton, March 28.—John Jenkins and two sons, Trenton and Leslie, and Neal Blackwell, were acquitted in the district court yesterday of a charge of arson. The three were indicted jointly on the charge of having burned the village of Rio last fall. This morning an affidavit was preferred against Mrs. Oliver Williams, the leading witness for the State in the case, on a charge of perjury. Mrs. Williams readily gave bond for \$100.

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
