T. D. FLYNN TO BE ARRESTED.

Brilliant Young Attorney and Lead-
er in Reform Circles.

New Orleans, April 5.—For sever-
al days past rumors have been flying
about the city that a prominent at-
torney-at-law and notary public had
ABSCONDED AND LEFT SHORT-
AGES

amounting to from \$27,000 to \$30,-
000.

The name of Thomas D. Flynn, a
young attorney, who had been promi-
nently identified with various reform
movements in the city, was mention-
ed in connection with the rumors,
and upon inquiry being made it was
discovered that Flynn had left the
city and had been absent about two
weeks. Flynn had been attorney
and notary for the Commonwealth
Homestead Association, No. 414 Hen-
nen Building, of which John A. Bar-
rett is president, and it was reported
that the principal portion of the
shortages would fall upon that com-
pany.

The culmination came yesterday,
when the district attorney's office,
having become cognizant of the rum-
ors, commenced an investigation.
Assistant District Attorney War-
ren Doyle, with his customary
promptness, at once sent for the of-
ficers of the homestead association
and at 1 o'clock yesterday they were
closeted with him.

During the afternoon instructions
were issued to Inspector Reynolds to

on sight and detectives were at once
started out on the chase. They dis-
covered, however, that Flynn was
not in the city and no one could in-
form them when he would return.
Flynn had his office in the Bank
of Orleans building on Gravier, be-
tween Carondelet and Baronne
streets, and a visit to that place dis-
covered the fact that Flynn's office
and his notarial records had been
taken charge of by Charles I. Dene-
chaud, who had been employed by
the homestead association to replace
Mr. Flynn and take charge of the
business of the office. Inquiry at the
office showed that Mr. Flynn had left
the city about ten days ago and he
left word that he was over in the
zone belt looking for a place to
send his wife, who was quite ill.
Just where he was could not be said.

was the reply to inquiries. Parties
who inquired gave an excuse for
looking him up that they desired to
send him a telegram on very impor-
tant business, but either the persons
in Flynn's office would not tell, or
they really did not know where he
was. At any rate, they could or
would neither say where he was nor
when he was likely to return, except
the very vague and indefinite infor-
mation that he might come in in a
few days or by the end of next week.
This was about all the information
that could be obtained, but later the
police claimed to have received a
tip as to his whereabouts, but it was
far from certain.
