WOMEN AND CHILDREN CRUSHED IN STAMPEDE.

New York, April 3.—Since his arrival among the cotton and woolen mill strikers of Passaic, Wm. D. Haywood, the labor leader, has been delivering speeches, and to-day there were riots and fights about the mill of Forstman & Hussmann...

Wearing badges of "Don't be a scab" on their breasts, about 500 strikers gathered about the mill of Forstman & Hussmann early in the morning. Their ranks were swelled by men, women and children who joined them in denouncing the non-union men as they went toward the mill...

Frank Battisto, a striker, started a fight with a nonunion man, and was arrested by a policeman. This started the row, which soon developed into a serious riot. Sticks and stones were hurled by the strikers at the police and deputies. The women, who were in the crowd, were mistreated. An attempt to rescue Battisto was made, and there was a lively battle.

All of the deputies were armed with long clubs, and they and the police charged the crowd of rioters again and again. Some of the deputies and policemen were hit with stones and cut. This infuriated them, and they swung their clubs on heads wherever they got a chance. In the stampede women and children were knocked down and trampled upon. Several strikers had their heads laid open by the clubs of the police. One woman was severely clubbed, the strikers said. There were twenty injured before the riot was over.

After the riot the strikers held a meeting in a hall and were addressed by Heywood, who told them to get the names of the deputies who did the clubbing, saying that they would be taken care of. He told them that before the strike was over Passaic would be known the world over as well as Lawrence.

Heywood has done nothing but create trouble since his arrival in Passaic. Boris Reinstein, the general organizer of the Industrial Workers of the World, has had charge of the strike. When Heywood arrived he denounced Reinstein as not belonging to the genuine organization of the Industrial Workers of the World to which Heywood belongs and has its headquarters in Chicago. Heywood induced about 500 of Reinstein's followers to bolt his organization and with these bolters has begun a campaign of "direction action." Heywood has organized pickets and trouble is looked for.

Robert Conklin, sheriff of Bergen county, is so apprehensive of further violence in the strike situation of the eight different mills whose employees are on strike in Passaic and its adjoining towns that he will swear in thirty more deputies to-day to handle the strikers.
