**POINTERS FOR THE MOTORIST.**  
How Tires Should be Washed.

At this season of the year when roads, in consequence of spring showers, are often muddy, most motor cars are coming in for their share of washing.

Washing tires and washing a car are two different propositions, says the Michelin tire expert. Water alone should be used to wash tires and as little of it as is necessary.

After every run the envelope should be wiped clean with a damp sponge or well-wrung cloth.

A common mistake made by motorists is to mix kerosene with water. This may be advisable when washing the body of a car to remove mud and dust from the varnish, but it should never be done when washing tires.

When washing tires it is best simply to dampen a sponge with clean water, care being taken that the sponge is not soaked and dripping then wipe the tires dry with a cloth or handful of waste.

**PETITION.**

The following petition will be taken up by the police jury at their next regular meeting May 20, 1912: To the Honorable President and Members of the Police Jury of St. Tammany Parish, La.

We, the undersigned voters and property holders, residents of St. Tammany parish, present to your honorable body, this, our petition, praying that you establish another ward in this parish to be known as the Tenth Ward, out of this territory adjacent to and including Abita Springs. We request that you include in this ward the following described land-to-wit:

Sections 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 15, 16, 17, 18, 19, 20, 21, 22, 27, 28, 29, 30, 31, 32, 33, 34, 38, township 6, south, range 12 east, St. Helena Meridian.

The east half of sections 1, 12, 23, 24, 25 and 36, township 6 south, range 11 east, St. Helena Meridian.

Sections 3, 4, 5 and 6, township 7 south, range 12 east, St. Helena Meridian.  
Your petitioners claim that the third ward is entirely too large and that the material interest of their section of the ward will be greatly enhanced, if the management of its local affairs should be left to the residents thereof. They feel that they would be in a better position to obtain good roads and better schools and that by thus building up the section would enhance the beauty and importance of that section, and thereby add to the wealth and prestige of St. Tammany parish.

Act of 1877, extra session, authorized the several police juries of the parishes to establish new wards and change the lines of existing wards. Under this act, your honorable body has the power to create or establish the ward prayed for by two-thirds of your members concurring.

**COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS.**

Covington, April 8, 1912. The council met, on above date pursuant to adjournment. Present: F. G. Marrero mayor, and Aldermen J. L. Smith, R. L. Aubert, P. J. Lacroix, Emile Beaucoudray, Leon Herbert and M. P. Planche.

The following resolution was then read: Resolution No. 5, New Series. Calling a special election to be held in the town of Covington, in the parish of St. Tammany, State of Louisiana, for the purpose of submitting to the property taxpayers of said town, qualified to vote therein, a proposition as to whether or not they will incur debt and issue negotiable bonds therefor, for the purpose of purchasing or erecting, constructing and installing a system of waterworks within and throughout the corporate limits of the town of Covington, the title to which shall be vested in the public.

Be it resolved by the Mayor and Council of the town of Covington, in regular session convened, that a special election be called, and is hereby called, to be held within the corporate limits of the town of Covington, for the purpose of submitting to the taxpayers thereof, who are authorized to vote at such elections, under the Constitution and laws of the State of Louisiana, the proposition as to whether or not they will incur debt to the sum or amount of sixty thousand dollars, and issue negotiable bonds therefor; the object for which said debt is to be incurred

is to purchase, or construct, erect, install and maintain and operate a system of waterworks within and throughout the corporate limits of said town of Covington, the title to which shall be vested in the public. That the debt to be incurred and the negotiable bonds to be issued therefor, shall run for a period of forty years, commencing with the year 1912, and bear interest thereon at the rate of five per cent per annum from date of said bonds, until paid, interest payable semi-annually.

Be it further resolved, etc., That the election herein called and provided for shall be held thirty days after due and public notice of the same has been given as required by law, and that the polling place for the holding of said election shall be the same place at which State and town elections are now held, namely, at the court house in the town of Covington. That the polls shall be opened at seven o'clock a. m., and closed at five o'clock p. m.

Be it further resolved, etc., That due and public notice be given of the calling and holding of said special election, said notice setting forth the date and place of holding of the same, the hours of the opening and closing of the polls, and for the purpose of what is hereby instructed, authorized and empowered to give said public notice, and in the manner and under the form required by law.

**PUBLIC NOTICE.**

Public notice is hereby given to all property taxpayers of the town of Covington, in the parish of St. Tammany, State of Louisiana, that a special election has been called by the mayor and town council of the town of Covington, according to a resolution adopted by them at their regular meeting held on the 8th day of April, 1912, and will be held in said town for the purpose of submitting to the property taxpayers thereof, who are authorized to vote at such elections under the provisions of the Constitution and laws of the State of Louisiana, the proposition as to whether or not they will incur debt to the sum and in the amount of Sixty Thousand Dollars and issue negotiable bonds therefor. The object for which the debt is to be incurred and the negotiable bonds issued therefor is to purchase, or construct, erect, install and maintain and operate a system of waterworks within and throughout the corporate limits of said town of Covington, the title to which shall be vested in the public. That the debt to be incurred and the negotiable bonds to be issued therefor, shall run for a period of forty years, commencing with the year 1912, and shall bear interest thereon at the rate of five per centum per annum from date of said bonds until paid, interest thereon to be paid semi-annually.

That the election herein called will be held on the 14TH DAY OF MAY, 1912, at the court house, within the town of Covington, which is the usual place for the holding of State and town elections. The polls shall be opened from seven o'clock a. m. and close at five o'clock p. m.

That all property taxpayers of said town of Covington, qualified as electors under the provisions of the Constitution and laws of the State of Louisiana shall be entitled to vote at said election. The qualifications to vote at said special election, are, age, residence, registration and poll tax payments for the years 1910 and 1911, except resident women taxpayers, who shall have the right to vote at such special election without registration and poll tax payments, either in person or by their agents authorized in writing, which written authorization shall be attached to such agent's ballots.

Public notice is further given that on the 14th day of May, 1912, at the hour of election, there will be at the mayor's office, within the town of Covington, the mayor and town council of the town of Covington, will in open session, proceed publicly to open the ballot boxes containing the ballots in number and amount, and to examine and canvass the returns, and there and then declare publicly the result of said election.
