Bridge to be built across Simalooza near Luke Allison's place. Length of bridge 200 feet, 12 feet wide. All material to be heart. Mud sills to be 10x12, cap sill to be 8x10 and 3 uprights to every bent with 2 braces 2x3 to each bent. 6 stringers 3x12-20 to every span and guard rails to be 4x2-20. 10 inch log screws with one washer to be used three to every 20 feet. Banisters to be 4 feet high from top of cap sill, uprights to be 4x4 with one brace to each. All braces for banisters to be 3/4 feet long, one hub guard on each side 2x6, and top of banisters to be finished with 2x6.
