## MR. MORGAN STRAITS.

Candidate for Congress Makes Good Impression at Greensburg.

Greensburg, Aug. 8.—Lewis L. Morgan, of Covington, accompanied by his campaign manager, Caleb C. Weber, and Senator J. Alford, delivered an address at the court house here at 8 o'clock Tuesday evening in the interest of his candidacy for Congress. A large audience was in attendance from Greensburg and the surrounding country.  
At the request of Mr. Morgan, Mr. H. McClinton of Abite, who was touring the parish, was asked to make an address in his own behalf as candidate for re-election for district attorney of the Twenty-sixth Judicial District. Mr. T. Holland was made chairman, and introduced the speaker. Mr. Morgan's speech was good, void of sarcasm and superficial promises, and made a favorable impression.

## MR. MORGAN AT WILSON.

Wilson, Aug. 8.—Lewis L. Morgan, candidate for Congress from the 6th Congressional District, last night spoke to the largest political gathering ever assembled in Wilson. The meeting was called to order by Julius Adler. Mr. Morgan was introduced by T. A. East, secretary of the late Congressman Wickliffe. Mr. Morgan outlined his policies on the current issues and was very heartily applauded. After the meeting a dance followed, the march being led by Mr. Morgan and Mrs. Julius Adler.

## MORGAN ADDRESSES CLINTON AUDIENCE.

Clinton, Aug. 8.—Hon. Lewis L. Morgan, of St. Tammany, addressed the voters here yesterday in behalf of his candidacy for Congress. He had a good audience and his remarks were well received. The meeting was called to order by John A. White, who presented Frank Hardesty as chairman. The speaker severely criticized his opponents.

Baton Rouge, Aug. 9.—Lewis L. Morgan, of St. Tammany, candidate for Congress from the Sixth Congressional District, will speak in Baton Rouge Monday night, formally opening his campaign here. Mr. Morgan is now campaigning in East Feliciana parish. He has just completed a tour of the Florida parishes, and his campaign manager, C. C. Weber, declares that the tour was highly successful.

## THE ROSENTHAL MURDER.

People High in Social Circles Who Rent Places for Improper Purposes are Target.

New York, Aug. 8.—Possibly the most interesting development in the many-sided investigation of the murder of Herman Rosenthal and his surrounding muck of police graft is the news of John D. Rockefeller, Jr.'s inquiry into the underworld conditions, particularly as to the white slave traffic.  
While Mr. Rockefeller and his agents decline to discuss the matter and District Attorney Whitman will furnish no details, it is generally credited that through the establishment of what purported to be a disorderly house in the Tenderloin agents for Mr. Rockefeller have gathered a great deal of valuable material. Primarily this was to be used as a basis for legislation aimed to check the traffic in girls, but coincidentally it dovetailed with the Rosenthal inquiry, because, it is said, evidence was obtained showing that a police inspector was getting \$600 a month from reports of Rosenthal and his associates.  
This data will be at the prosecutor's disposal to use along with the confessions of "Bald Jack" Rose and others.  
Hughes Breaks Down.  
"I know nothing of the details of this matter," said Mr. Whitman today. "It is being handled by John D. Rockefeller, Jr., who has been of great service to this community in the white slave investigation. No man has done more to hold up my hands in particular difficult business of finding out who are the guilty persons in certain kinds of criminality."  
The Rockefeller evidence was collected by Clifford Roe, a detective who was active in the Chicago vice crusade.  
Police Commissioner Waldo has been successful in securing evidence which will enable the department to dismiss any racket that may be guilty of wrongdoing.  
Chief Inspector Edward P. Hughes head of the Detective Bureau, has broken down under the strain of the Rosenthal case and is seriously ill at a hospital in Brooklyn of pleuro-pneumonia.  
After the Landlords.  
Alderman Curran, chairman of the special committee of the Board of Aldermen appointed to investigate police conditions, said today that not only the landlords, but the owners of places where gambling went on.  
"We intend to reach the landlords who rent out their buildings for illegal purposes," said Mr. Curran. "This may hit some whose names are writ high in what we call social circles. They know to what purpose their premises are being used and if they do not they should be glad to get information upon the subject."  
No date has been set for the first meeting of the commission.  
On Tuesday William J. Burns admitted today that his men have been taking part in the graft investigation. Agents of his, he said, had been working to secure evidence that "protection money" was being collected from keepers of disorderly houses and gambling establishments, while others of his agents had secured positions as waiters in the Hotel Metropole, in front of which Rosenthal met death.  
"I have," Mr. Burns said, "uncovered a lot of evidence that will startle the public when it comes out."

## U. S. SOLDIERS AGAIN TARGETS OF MEXICANS.

El Paso, Tex., Aug. 7.—Mexicans fired again last night on United States troops guarding the border. The firing this time occurred almost opposite El Paso, three or four miles from where shots were exchanged last week between United States troops and Mexicans.

The shots were fired from the Mexican side of the river and appeared to be aimed at American soldiers camped near the smelter. The Americans returned the bullets.

The soldiers believe the firing was done by rebel patrolmen with malicious intent.

The affair was reported officially today to Gen. E. Z. Steever, commanding the department of Texas.
