AMENDMENT TO CHARTER.

State of Louisiana, Parish of St. Tammany.

Be it known that on this 15th day of August, A. D., 1912, before me, Benjamin M. Miller, a notary public, duly commissioned and qualified in and for the parish of St. Tammany, State of Louisiana, and in the presence of the undersigned witnesses, personally called and appeared W. A. Hood, Vice President, and H. B. Collins, Secretary, of the Covington Naval Stores Company, Limited, (G. F. Mason, the President of the said corporation being absent), in their capacity as such Vice President and Secretary of said corporation, who declare that at a meeting of the stockholders of said Covington Naval Stores Company, Limited, duly held on the 16th day of August, 1912, after due notice by advertisement, and by personal notice to each stockholder, in the manner and for the time required by law and by the charter of the corporation, which meeting was called for the purpose of considering the following propositions, viz:

1st. To change the domicile of said company from Covington, Louisiana, to New Orleans, Louisiana; and,

2d. To change the number of directors of said corporation from seven (7) to five (5); and,

3d. At which meeting there were present, in person or by duly authorized proxy, stockholders representing more than three-fourths of the entire capital stock of said corporation; it was unanimously voted and decided that Article One (1) of the charter of this corporation be and the same was amended so as to read as follows:

"Article 1. The name and title of the said corporation shall be Covington Naval Stores Company, Ltd., and its domicile is hereby established in the city of New Orleans, Louisiana; and under its corporate name, said corporation shall have the power to contract, sue and be sued; to make and use a corporate seal, and the same to break and alter at pleasure; to hold, receive, have, purchase lease, improve, alienate, convey, sell, borrow, pledge, mortgage and hypothecate, under its said corporate name, property, real, personal and mixed; to name and appoint such officers, directors, managers and agents or employees, as the convenience or interest of said corporation may require; to make and establish by-laws, rules and regulations for the proper management and regulation of its affairs, as may be deemed necessary; and to do all other acts and things permitted by law, or as shall or may be necessary and proper to carry out the objects and purposes of said corporation.

Said corporation, unless sooner dissolved, in accordance with its charter, shall exist and continue for a period of ninety-nine years from and after the date hereof.

The president, or in his absence the vice president, shall be the proper person upon whom citation or other legal process shall be served."

And at said meeting of said stockholders it was unanimously decided and voted that Article Four (4) of the charter of this corporation be and the same was amended so as to read as follows:

"Article 4. The corporate powers of this corporation shall be vested in and exercised by a Board of five (5) Directors. Three (3) of said directors shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business, and their decisions shall be valid corporate acts."

And said officers declare that all things done and all proceedings had by said stockholders at such meeting, were done and had in accordance with law and with the provisions of the charter of said corporation.

CHARTER OF THE HOULTON LUMBER COMPANY.

United States of America, State of Louisiana, Parish of St. Tammany.

Be it known that on this 10th day of July, A. D., 1912, before me, Harvey E. Ellis, a notary public in and for the parish of St. Tammany, State of Louisiana, duly commissioned and qualified, and in the presence of the witnesses hereinafter named and undersigned, personally came and appeared the persons whose names are hereinafter subscribed, all of full age and residents of St. Tammany parish, La., who severally declared that, availing themselves of the provisions of the laws of this State relative to corporations and their organization, they have covenanted and agreed, and by these presents do covenant and agree, and bind themselves as well as such other persons as may hereafter become associated with them, to form and constitute a body politic in law, for the purposes and objects, and under the stipulations, articles and conditions following, to-wit:

The name and title of said corporation shall be the HOULTON LUMBER COMPANY, and its domicile is hereby established at Houltonville, St. Tammany parish, Louisiana; and under its corporate name, said corporation shall have, obtain and be authorized to contract, sue and be sued; to make and use a corporate seal, and the same to break and alter at pleasure; to hold, receive, have, purchase, improve, alienate, convey, sell, borrow, pledge, mortgage and hypothecate, under its said corporate name, property, real, personal and mixed; to name and appoint such officers, directors, agents and managers or employees, as the interest or convenience of said corporation may require; to make and establish by-laws, rules and regulations for the proper management and regulation of its affairs, as may be deemed necessary; and to do all other acts and things permitted by law, and as shall be necessary and proper to carry out the objects and purposes of said corporation.

Said corporation, unless sooner dissolved, in accordance with its charter, shall exist and continue for a period of ninety-nine years from and after the date hereof.

The President, or in his absence, the Vice President, or in the absence of both, the Secretary, shall be the proper persons upon whom citation and other legal process shall be served; and the President, or in his absence, the Vice President, shall be authorized to bring all suits and legal proceedings on behalf of this corporation.

ARTICLE II. The objects and purposes for which this corporation is organized and the nature of the business to be carried on by it, are hereby declared to be, to operate and run a saw and planing mill and mills in the parishes of St. Tammany, Tangipahoa and Washington, in the State of Louisiana, or elsewhere; to manufacture, transport and sell lumber and its by-products; to lease buy and sell timber lands and other real estate; to carry on a general business for the manufacture and sale of turpentine, rosin and their by-products; to conduct a general mercantile business or businesses; to build, own, lease and operate barges, lighters, sail, gasoline and steam vessels; to construct, maintain, own or lease and operate tramways or log roads, and generally to do all things that are necessary, incidental to or connected with the carrying on of said businesses and the objects and purposes hereinabove set forth.

ARTICLE III. The capital stock of this corporation is hereby fixed at the sum of Five Hundred Thousand and No One Hundredths (\$500,000.00) Dollars, divided into and represented by Five Thousand (5000) shares of the par value of One Hundred and No One Hundredths (100.00) Dollars each, which stock may be issued at not less than par for cash, or in payment or exchange for property or rights actually received or purchased by said corporation, provided that all stock shall be paid for in full within six months after same shall have been subscribed for, and no stock shall be issued unless the consideration therefor has been received by said corporation.

All stock certificates shall be signed by the President and Secretary of said corporation, and all transfers of stock shall be made on the books of said company, at its offices on the surrender of the original certificate.

No stockholder shall have authority or right to sell or otherwise dispose of his stock in whole or part, without first giving the Board of Directors ten (10) days written notice of his intention or desire to dispose of any of his stock or a part thereof, and allowing the Board of Directors or in its default, any stockholder, the first opportunity of purchasing the stock.

This corporation shall commence doing business as soon as Three Hundred Thousand and No One Hundredths (\$300,000.00) Dollars of its capital stock shall have been subscribed for, as above provided.

ARTICLE IV. The corporate powers of this corporation shall be vested in and exercised by a Board of Directors, which shall consist of three (3) stockholders; a majority of whom shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. Said Directors shall be elected annually from among the stockholders on the 1st day of January of each year, commencing on the 1st day of January, 1913.

Notice of such election shall be given by two (2) publications in a newspaper published in St. Tammany parish, La., within fifteen (15) days immediately preceding said election.

At said election, and at all other meetings of the stockholders the voting shall be by ballot, and each share of stock shall be entitled to one vote by its owner in person, or by written proxy.

Within ten days of their election

as above provided for, the Board of Directors shall elect from among their number a President, a Vice President, and a Secretary and Treasurer, provided one person may hold the office of both Secretary and Treasurer, and all of said officers and directors shall hold their respective offices for a period of one (1) year from the date of their election, or until their successors are elected. But the failure to hold an annual election, or to elect the officers as provided for, shall not result in a dissolution of this corporation but the three Board of Directors and officers shall hold their offices until their successors are duly elected.

Any vacancies occurring in said Board of Directors shall be filled by the remaining members of the Board for the unexpired term, at a meeting called for that purpose after five (5) days notice in writing, sent by mail to said directors at their last known residence.

The said Board of Directors shall have the power to make all by-laws, rules and regulations for the proper management and conduct of the affairs of this corporation, and to change, alter, abolish and amend same at pleasure, and shall have and exercise all the powers conferred by law on this corporation; and as set forth generally above.
